

Adding and Subtracting: Developing Personal Strategies

As early as second grade, students are expected to take what they know about adding and subtracting single digits to adding and subtracting greater numbers. Research has shown that students can have more success if they are given many opportunities to develop their own personal strategies before moving to more traditional algorithms.

Below is a representation of 3 different strategies students used to add 37+48. These strategies use number sense and lend themselves to mental math.

37 + 48



Flexiblity with numbers brings meaning to the more traditional algorithms. This traditional algorithm focuses on single digits but with number sense children understand the 1+3+4 is a "short cut " for adding 10+30+40 and therefore understand that 85 is a reasonable answer.
