### **Attendance Matters!**

- \* Attendance matters as early as kindergarten. Studies show many children who miss too many days in kindergarten and first grade can struggle academically in later years. They often have trouble mastering reading by the end of third grade.
- \* Too many absent students can affect the whole classroom by slowing down instruction.

Please be aware of school start times (the first bell goes at 8:00 am) and completion times (Primary dismissal at 2:00 and Upper Elementary 2:15). Tardy students usually don't enter the classroom quietly – instruction can be disrupted; and leaving early is often difficult on the students and teacher.

To highlight the importance of attendance, we will acknowledge student Perfect Attendance each month of the year.
