### Consider Nonfiction for your next book to share with your child

How often do you read a nonfiction text to your child? Most parents who read to their children choose a story. However, much recent research supports choosing an informational text, such as a book or magazine, instead. As adults, we spend most of our days reading and writing informational text. Students, even young students, benefit from hearing about inventions, countries, animals, planets, and the weather.

Why choose informational text?

- Many children prefer it.
- It stimulates conversation, which improves comprehension. It improves vocabulary knowledge and understandings in science, math, social studies, health, music, and art.
- It helps develop understanding of how to read charts, graphs, diagrams, and maps.
- It helps students to learn to write nonfiction, such as reports.

Next time you are ready to read with your child consider nonfiction. The most important point of all is to pick something that you both will enjoy!

Author Robert Rayner visited our school this month and shared his love of writing. He read excerpts from his various books and lead two small group writing activities. This provided stretch learning for some of our students.

Making Sense of Anxiety—The escalating levels of anxiety in our children begs for an explanation as well as a solution.

Mrs. Perkins Love will be offering a 4-week course beginning Wednesday, January 29th entitled Making Sense of Anxiety in Children and Youth. This course will be based on the work of Dr. Gordon Neufeld, a developmental psychologist from Vancouver, B.C.

Dr. Neufeld brings a fresh and promising perspective to one of our most troubling and perplexing human problems. Dr. Neufeld sheds light on this age-old problem, paving the way for natural interventions that can actually get to the root causes as opposed to just managing symptoms.

This course will be held January 29th, February 5th, 12th and 19th from 7:00 - 9:00 pm. It will be comprised of videos and group discussions. The Cool Cats had an active role to play in Be Cool Week. There were daily announcements which provided students with 4 different strategies for acting Cool when being teased. They are: Ignore It, Laugh It Off, Change the Subject, and Ask the Teaser to Stop. Even the kindergarten children understand that being hot means blowing up, being cold means giving up, and that neither way solves the problem. But being COOL means staying in control and can solve the problem.

During the Be Cool assemblies, the Cool Cats' reinforced the importance of Following the I-Care Rules and Living the 7 Habits in learning to be Cool. There will be many more ways of being Cool that will be introduced throughout the year.

#### WORK BACKWARDS

What if you know the result of a situation, but you don't know the beginning? For example, you might know that you end up with thirteen baseball cards after doing a certain number of trades and you want to figure out how many cards you had before the trading started. In that case you need to work backwards; you have to think about your actions in reverse order. This strategy works for any sequence of actions when you know the end result rather than the starting place. Try working backwards to solve these problems:
