Tune In To Interesting "Million Dollar" Words

When children learn to tune in to interesting million dollar words, they build awareness and understanding of words. This leaves them with "thinking power" to comprehend and make meaning of what is read. They expand their vocabulary by focusing on these new words and their meaning. By looking for words that are interesting and unique, children not only increase their vocabulary, but they also enhance their comprehension. A child must have multiple exposures to a word before it becomes part of his/her vocabulary.

The children are learning that picking the "just right" word will get the message across clearly and precisely. Too often they have relied on overused words such as "said" and "nice." Keep that in mind as you read out loud. Ask your child to listen for million dollar words. If, for example, your child suggests that "yelled" is a good substitution for "said" then he/she has made the connection.

How can you help your child with this strategy at home?

- 1.) When your child is reading or you are reading to your child, ask your child to find three interesting million dollar words. Have your child write these words down and talk about the meaning of these words. See if anyone in your family is able to use these words in a sentence.
- 2.) Encourage your child to find interesting million dollar words when watching television or in daily conversation. When tuning in to an interesting word, help your child understand the meaning of the word.
- 3.) As you are reading a magazine, newspaper, or book, tune into an interesting million dollar word and share it with your child.
- 4.) Compile a list of these interesting words on the fridge or some other predominant place, and continually add to the list.

Have fun with words!

# COUNSELOR'S CORNER: BUILDING SKILLS AT HOME IN FEBRUARY HABIT 4: THINK WIN-WIN

Thinking win-win (or always thinking about another as well as yourself) is one of the great mental habits we can teach our kids. After all life isn't just about me, it's not just about you, it's about all of us. In order to think win-win, we have to balance courage for getting what we want with consideration for what others want. We must look for ways to make deposits into other people's emotional bank accounts. When conflicts arise, those who think win-win look for third alternatives.

When we work to find ways for everyone to be happy we actually enjoy life more. In habit four, basic types of thinking mindsets are examined. Win-lose is the mindset of winning no matter what. Win-lose is competitive and in the end usually backfires on us. You may end up on top of the totem pole but you may be alone.

The next mindset is lose-win. This mindset on the other hand is when you are a doormat. You are always giving in and not sticking up for yourself. Then there is the lose-lose mindset. This is the downward spiral way of thinking. If I am going down than you are too.

The best mindset is win-win which is the belief that everyone can win. This is the mindset that shows you care about other people and want them to succeed but you also care about yourself and want to succeed. It's the belief that there is plenty of success to go around.

## **Problem Solving Strategy of the Month**

### **WORK BACKWARDS**



What if you know the result of a situation, but you don't know the beginning? For example, you might know that you end up with thirteen baseball cards after doing a certain number of trades and you want to figure out how many cards you had before the trading started. In that case you need to work backwards; you have to think about your actions in reverse order. This strategy works for any sequence of actions when you know the end result rather than the starting place. Try working backwards to solve these problems:

K - 2	3 - 5	Challenge!
What is the starting number?    Subtract 2	Jo gave a number problem to Nelda. She told her to pick a number, add 10 to it, double that sum, and then subtract 5. Nelda's answer was 39. What number did she start with?	What is the starting number?  Start at □  Add 6  Multiply by 2  Divide by 8  End at 9.
