Here are few more tips on How to Raise a Reader!

- Have your child read to the dog! No kidding! Dogs are good, nonjudgmental listeners.
- Be a role model. Let your child catch you reading a cookie recipe, instruction manual, news article, novel, non-fiction book, etc.
- Stay positive! Be reassuring and supportive, never critical. You want your child to look forward to reading and to enjoy it. Reading is hard work, and your encouragement goes far!



SPEAKING OF SPEECH AND LANGUAGE...

(FROM THE ASD-S SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY DEPARTMENT)

Vocabulary

Vocabulary refers to the knowledge and understanding of word meanings and how words are related. Vocabulary is the basis for learning language and is critical for developing literacy skills and reading comprehension. Learning of new words happens at school, in the home and in the community. Teachers provide direct instruction for new words when teaching specific topics such as science or math. Parents can extend this learning at home.

Extend Learning:

- Play word games such as Scrabble, Boggle, Charades or Scattergories
- Visit new places such as a museum, library, zoo, or attraction (e.g. lighthouse, park, pet store) and talk about all the new things you see
- Use apps that encourage vocabulary development
- Read a variety of book types including non-fiction and magazines
- Have your child explain in their own words what the "new" word means
- Encourage reading and writing at home
- Encourage your child to tell you about his or her day

Apps Suggestions:

- I imagine by Bizzibrains Students create characters, find fun interactions, read along with the story and answer comprehension questions
- Let's Name Things by SuperDuperInc Students name items they see in pictures
- Shadow Puppet by Shadow Puppet Students combine photos, videos and voice to tell a story, demonstrate a
 task of explain a concept
- What Does Miss Bee See? by SuperDuperInc Students name items they see in pictures

Guidance

A positive day at school begins and ends with a pleasant routine at home. Try these ideas for establishing success-building habits with your child.

A Fresh Start—A calm morning can help your child go to school with a positive attitude. Build an extra 10 minutes into his or her wake-up time to allow for mishaps like spilled food or for quiet time with family.

Screen-Time Limits—Large doses of TV, video games, and apps can affect a child's ability to focus using self-control. Encourage outside play and reading for pleasure. It is recommended that children have no more than two hours screen time a day.

Rest—A set bedtime helps kids fall asleep more quickly. Suggest that your child get in bed 15 minutes early to read, make up stories, or talk quietly with you.

Outdoor Play

Please make sure that your child is dressed properly for the outdoors including snow pants, hats and mittens. We always have extra hats and mittens at school. If your child needs some, we would be happy to provide them.



A Call for Reading Volunteers

Are you looking to share your love of reading and get involved in your community? Elementary Literacy Inc. is a not-for-profit charitable organization with the mission to work closely with educators, parents and communities for increasing literacy rates across New Brunswick. To support this effort, Elementary Literacy Inc. offers the Elementary Literacy Friends Program (Elf) in Anglophone schools across NB.

The Elf Program is a one-on-one reading achievement program matching trained community volunteers with Grade 2 children who require additional reading practice. The volunteer commitment is one hour, twice a week for ten weeks. Volunteer sessions take place in the school at the end of the day. The next training session is taking place on January 27 from 1-4 pm at the Saint John Free Public Library, Market Square.
