Guidance Corner

Kindness is spreading all across Dr. A. T. Leatherbarrow! Just a few minutes is all that is needed and you can witness our students comforting other students when they are sad or hurt, asking others to play when they are looking for a playmate, and taking turns sharing the sand toys and the swings. It is so wonderful to see the smiles spread across their faces when they do kind things to help others. It is truly contagious.

The students at our school our becoming top notch problem solvers when it comes to getting along with others. They love telling you how they used their WITS to solve their problems. They know to Walk away, Ignore, Talk it out, and Seek help and they are putting their skills in action every day.

Has your child been coming home saying they are in the "Green Zone"? or the "Red Zone", "Yellow Zone" or "Blue Zone"? It's because we have been discussing the "Zones of Regulation". It is a program to help students identify their feelings and work on strategies to help them manage these feelings. There are four Colour Zones: The Blue zone describes when you are feeling tired, sick or sad. The Green zone is the 'ready to learn' zone. You're happy, calm and focused. The Yellow zone is when you are feeling frustrated, worried, or on the flipside you may be feeling silly and excited. The Red zone is when you feel angry, mad or extremely upset, or conversely you may be feeling elated. The students can now identify what zone they are in at a given time and they know that their zone can change throughout the day and that the change can happen because of either a positive or a negative "trigger". A trigger can be good, like a present, or negative like dropping your ice cream cone. As the students explore and learn about their zones, they are also learning strategies to help them manage their feelings to try to stay in the calm, ready to learn, green zone. Thinking happy thoughts, doing deep breathing, yoga, taking a break, asking for help and talking to a caring adult are some strategies that the students are learning about. You can make your own "feelings bottle" at home to help create a feeling of calm in your child just by taking an old pop bottle, filling it with water, adding a few drops of food colouring and glitter. Shake the bottle and watch the glitter swirl around and settle back to a calm state. It's very relaxing.

The Rainbows Program is going to be offered at our school very soon. This is a support group for students who have suffered a significant loss in their lives, either through divorce, death, or other life altering crisis. We will have brochures ready and available at parent teacher. If you feel your child would benefit from this program please contact us.
