Integrated Service Delivery: Fostering the Positive Development of Children and Youth

Beginning in 2012, Education and Early Childhood Development, Social Development, Health, Public Safety, school districts and regional health authorities joined together to support an integrated service delivery model, commonly called ISD, to support children and their families throughout Charlotte County. This model, which facilitates the collaboration amongst the partners, helps to provide timely, supportive services to students. The ISD model is now used across the province.

The Vision

'The vision of ISD is to ensure the positive growth and development of children and youth with multiple needs, through the collective impact of its partners working together in an integrated manner and with a child or youth-centered approach to develop and implement appropriate interventions based on the strengths, needs and risks of identified children and youth.'

Who provides ISD services?

'Services are provided by **ISD Child and Youth Teams**. These teams are made up of caring professionals with training in counseling, social work, school and clinical psychology, education, nursing, mental health, and addictions. These professionals specialize in working with children and youth, and their families. Team members offer support, encouragement and treatment for children and youth. They are available to meet with parents and children to discuss areas of concern.'

How to access services:

A referral to the Child and Youth (C & Y) Team can be made in one of two ways. C & Y Teams work under the umbrella of Addiction and Mental Health Services. Parents can contact the St. Stephen and area Child and Youth Team directly at 466-7380 and the local office is at 41 King Street, St. Stephen. The second option is for the school to make a referral, after parental consent has been received. After the referral has been made, a meeting will be set up with the family and the student to determine what supports will be appropriate. A decision may be made for the student to see their C & Y Team worker at school or at the King Street office. This will be decided by the student and their family. Please call the school or the C & Y Team with any questions.
