#### Graduation Requirements

Students are responsible to make sure they have the following compulsory credits for graduation:

- ► English 11A: Literary Texts
- English 11B: Informational Texts
- ► English 12
- ► Math 2 of (NFR 10, Foundations 110, Fin & Work 110 or NBCC Skilled trades math 120)
- Modern History 11
- ▶ 1 Science credit
- ▶ 1 Fine Arts/Life Role Credit
- 5 Grade 12 credits
- A total of 18 credits




#### Admission Information

- Students must check to see that they meet the admission requirements and deadlines of universities/colleges of interest.
- Early Admission Students will be assessed based on sem. 1 marks and grade 11 marks for early admission.

- Most institutions require a fee to process applications.
- For those students interested in residence a separate application is usually required, as is a separate fee. Residence is competitive, apply early.

#### Social Media!

Up to date info posted on university visits, scholarships, contests, things going on at post-secondary institutions, deadlines, etc.

Follow schools and programs of interest on Twitter, Instagram, etc.

#### Tips

- **Essay:**
- General essay:
  - about yourself, your character, resilience, service to others, etc.
  - outline why you deserve a scholarship
  - include leadership roles/activities
  - highlight what you've learned
  - how your experiences have helped shape you
- Ask an English teacher or Guidance Counsellor for support at any point in the essay-writing process
- can generally use the same essay, tweaking parts to make it fit that specific scholarship
- \*Sometimes, essays are answering question(s) in an essay format (be sure to follow the essay guidelines carefully for each scholarship)
- Once essay is written have it <u>proofread and</u> <u>edited</u> by: Teacher/Parent/Guidance

## Tips continued...

- Reference Letter(s):
- Give the person 2+ weeks notice
- Provide the name of scholarship
- Let them know the due date of the scholarship (or when you plan to submit your application)
- People to ask: coaches, teachers, work managers/supervisors
- Provide a "Brag Sheet", outlining all volunteer, sports, extra-curricular, leadership involvement (pick up a helpful sheet at Guidance ☺)
  - names of organizations, your role, dates
