Life Skills	Money Matters Part 2 – Paying Rent Last week you were asked to investigate meal planning and the cost of food for one week. When you graduate high school and move onto College/University or enter the work force, you may have to then start to figure out where to live. Where can you look for housing? What type of housing are you looking for? How can you find ways to save money? How much does housing cost? Will you have to make sacrifices on what you would like in order to be able to afford housing? Use different sources to research renting an apartment or house. Look through online ads, newspaper ads, or find websites that help you find housing. When you move out, are you looking at moving into residence? If so, investigate the costs of living on campus for a year. Will your parents be helping you with rent? Will you have to work to save money? Will you have to take out a loan? Try to find a housing situation where you could afford to live. It is very important that you do not actually contact anyone about renting, just use the ads to give you a good idea of the costs. How much money will your rent cost for the first year after High School? How can you assure that you have enough money to pay for that rent?
Phys. Ed.	Accuracy – working on accuracy can help you in many different sports and lifestyle activities. Here are some ideas on how to work on your accuracy at home.  Bean Bag toss – using a pair of rolled up socks, place a laundry basket a short distance away, and try to toss the socks into the basket. Move the basket farther away and try again. Try different angles and distances. Try to make 10 shots in a row from each angle.  Darts – If you have a dart board, you can practice your accuracy by playing darts. There are many games online that you can play alone if you have no one to play with.  Bowling – find empty plastic bottles and place them on a hard floor in a basic bowling pattern. Find a soft ball, or you can use a pair of rolled up socks and slide the ball towards the bottles to knock them down. To make it a little more difficult, add a little water to the bottles to make them heavier.  Shuffleboard – If you have a hard floor at home, use tape to mark out targets a distance away (use non-marking tape, like painter's tape). Use lids from jars and slide them across the floor to land in the targets. (Make sure the lids are clean and are not going to scratch the floor before starting).  Bocce ball – If you have a bocce ball set, great! If not, try to find several balls of the same size and shape. If playing indoors, you could use pairs of rolled up socks. Find another ball of smaller size (or a smaller pair of socks). Go online and research the rules of Bocce ball. It is a great way to pass time with a sibling or parent.
