- School improvement plan goals were presented and explained.
 1. To increase responsible decision in the classroom by rolling out the BEARS behavior matrix.
 2. To improve standards-based data tracking in language arts and math.
- Fall Poinsettia fundraiser – all proceeds will go to the new basketball court by the swings 285 plants sold, 1300\$ profit. This is 400\$ less than last year, however thoughts are that strike and Covid may have impacted profit. Less confusion with orders as only red plants were available.

- Online booking was favoured by parents and there were a total of 69 phone/virtual appointments. 37 families
