Ms. Sanderson talks all things musical

Exclusive interview with Ms. Sanderson, Harbour View's amazing band teacher. She talks about the struggles this past year and how she plans to move forward this semester.

Question: What were some problems at the start of the school year that you had to work around?

Ms. Sanderson: There were lots. The first couple weeks we were able to play inside, close together but there's just been a lot of changes. We were then allowed to play inside separated, then probably three weeks into the school year they said no playing inside. So, we had three grade 9 classes and three grade 10 classes that would take all the band stuff, all the chairs, all the stands, all the percussion stuff outside for class then we would play and bring it all back in, which is obviously not ideal.

Question: How did playing outside turn out for the classes last semester?

Ms. Sanderson: I would say with the grade 10 it went quite well because they had an idea what band was already. So, they understood what we were doing. But it's hard because we can't hear each other well. You can't hear yourself, there's wind, there's wasps. It's cold and it just takes a lot of time, we could be playing, except we're having to move stuff outside. With the nines it was very challenging because that was their introduction to the band program. They only really played their instruments up until just after the strike in November because once we came from the strike it was too cold to play outside. So they only ever played outside and not for very long.



Question: How are you planning to proceed with the band program this semester since some restrictions have been lifted? Are there any plans for a concert in the future?

Ms. Sanderson: Definitely plans for a concert. I keep trying to be optimistic. We're super lucky that we have the band room that we have. It's big, so we can fit quite a few students in here and still have them separated and meet the guidelines. We're also getting instrument masks delivered to us from the district free of charge. So those are basically cloth that will go over the openings of instruments to help prevent spread of aerosols. So that would mean that we could actually sit a little closer together because even though we're all in the same room, with some players being as far as 50 feet apart, it's hard to play together. So, we're hoping that will get us to move closer together. I'm just optimistic with the way restrictions are going in other provinces and I hope even by the end of April we will be closer together and be able to have a concert even if it's 50% capacity in the auditorium. So definitely planning concerts for sure.



Elatsoe by Darcie Little Badger is a magical realism novel. It includes aspects of mystery, teen struggles, and magic. It also has good representation for many under-represented people in young adult novels. The novel focuses on Elatsoe, an Lipan Apache girl, who has received the gift of raising the dead. This gift has been passed down through generations of her family and throughout the book she learns more about her gift and the power it holds.

The world in this novel is heavily based on our own, but with magic engrained. It is set in America, and life is like our own for Ellie. She is 18 years old and in her last year of high school. She is deciding on university and discovering what her future will hold. Her life is very relatable in that sense, but she also has the magical ability to raise the dead. Throughout the novel she reflects on her ancestors, specifically her six-great grandmother, and the lessons they can teach her. Much of Ellie's knowledge and magic come from indigenous stories and history. The magic of the world comes from the legends of people, some indigenous some not. This magic and the stories it come from adds a rich world-building aspect to the novel. The author is clear with the rules and history surrounding magic and makes it easy to follow and understand their world.

A refreshing part of this novel was its lack of main romance. I find in many books an author will try to include a romance even when it does not belong, and it takes away from the main point of the story. That is not the case in this story. There is a platonic friendship at the forefront of the story, and it never is hinted at becoming a romance. Ellie herself is asexual. The story keeps the focus on family and the struggles of loss. It is a story that focuses on indigenous stories and does not glaze over the hurt and brutality towards them in the past. It is a story about family, friends, and discovering yourself.

The fault I have with this novel is the inner dialogue of Ellie. While she is 18, many of her thoughts and actions and even how she is treated makes her seem much younger. As I was reading, I kept hearing her as a 13-year-old and was forced to constantly remind myself of her age. It pulled me out of the story and interrupted the flow and my view of the characters.



While the ages do not seem to match the writing, the characters themselves are well thought-out and carry a lot of personality. Everyone had distinct traits and it was easy to keep them all straight. Even her pet ghost dog had a loveable personality that shined through. Little Badger was able to show the grief of characters and was able to show the unique way people handle it. It was especially interesting learning about the Lipan Apache customs and traditions when it came to death and what the different characters relationship was with their culture.

Overall, this book was unique and offered great representation. The dialogue was a big miss for me as I judge a book a lot on its writing, but the other aspects of this book were executed to near perfection and made up for it. It was a quick read and I highly recommend you pick it up to learn and explore a unique story. It gets 4/5 stars.

The pacing plays a huge role in developing the atmosphere. Even when the plot starts to ramp up it never loses that no stalgic summer feeling because it will always take moments to discuss plans or gather information in common locations, such as when Ellie and her friend Jay were organizing information at an ice cream stand.

Throughout the story you learn lots about the magic system and how it works. *Elatsoe* has this unique way of keeping an air of mystery to its magic. It's established from the beginning that Ellie's ghost-calling is a family practice that has been passed down through generations though we never learn how it works or even how it is possible. The story also does a great job setting boundaries for the magic system. Everybody has the possibility of learning certain skills with practice, but some are strictly genetic and will fade over generations. The magic system is very natural and integrated as well, nothing ever felt out of place or overpowered.

I think by now it's obvious that I enjoyed reading *Elatsoe*. I think it will be the perfect read for the summer break and I look forward to rereading it again. It is filled with more personality and character than I ever expected from any novel. I give it five out of five stars. If you find yourself up late, bored one-night *Elatsoe* is the perfect book to reach out for. It will surprise you.
