Fascism vs The Modern Day

When talking about ways to run a government, people have 101 different ideas ranging from a borderline feudal society to anarchy, but few to none have been as destructive as Fascism. To start let me clearly define it. Fascism in its simplest form is ultra-nationalism paired with totalitarianism. It basically says that people should unite by Nationality, Ethnicity, or Religion to fight against those who seek to "destroy" them. When many people hear Fascism they think about the Nazi's and WW2 because this is when Fascism gained its popularity. Along with this many believe that fascism in Europe died the 3rd Reich after WW2. Spain remained under fascist control until 1972 when their dictator finally died. The reason people

don't realize Spain was Fascist is because they made a deal with the American government, and the Americans weren't keen on telling people about

To VERY quickly cover Fascism's history, it was created by Benito Mussolini. Mussolini successfully convinced a lot of people he could fix Italy's problems, so they gave him some power. In 1922 he seized more of it by threating the Italian government, and became the head of Italy. A little bit later an Austrian man in Germany named Adolf Hitler used basically the same tactic and became the head of Germany in 1933. Some men in Spain, most notably Francisco Franco, saw this and decided to try the same thing. Their coup failed, so they went with plan B and dragged Spain into a 3 year long civil war which they won. The Fascist coup and civil war destroyed Spain and crippled its economy. These regimes would go on to cause so much pain and suffering that the scars still show. I previously stated most of the oppressive regimes that Hitler set up would be dismantled and replaced by occupation zones that would become American or Soviet puppets. These regimes would oppress Europe for roughly 50 years till the end of the cold war.

During the Cold War. Fascism was kind of disregarded as a threat because people believed that Communism was a much more concerning threat. They were right that Communism was more of a threat, but they took this to an extreme by making deals with Fascists. They even made a member of the Nazi SS, Wernher Von Braun, the Chief Engineer of Nasa in. They recruited other Nazi scientists during Operation Paper clip. Walt Disney, as in Mickey Mouse Disney, hosted a party for the Nazi Party at Disneyland. He even worked with Von Braun to make a movie about space. It's clear that in the past we have neglected to act against fascists in the west, and we still do.

Fascism today isn't as prevalent as it used to be, but there are countless countries that are two steps away from Fascism. The four that come to mind are Russia, Iran, Saudi Arabia, and Israel. These countries have committed far too many human rights abuses, and the wars in Israel and Ukraine have shown that. The Middle East has become a paradise for developing Fascism. Terror groups like ISIS, The Taliban, Al-Qaeda, Hamas, and others have had been using what is effectively Fascism to promote their endless war against each other. These endless wars have turned the Middle East into a constant warzone.

Hamas and Israel are an interesting case because both employ borderline Fascist tactics to beat the other one. Israel's war crimes have made people scared to support them, and Hamas' use of terror attacks have made people scared to support them as well. The Israeli government cut off electricity, food, and water to Gaza, because Hamas massacred crowd of innocent people. Both Hamas and Israel's sole mission is to destroy the other one, and people in the west are doing nothing about it. The situation in Israel is horrible, and I genuinely hope they can come to a peaceful solution where no more people must die.

The current wars around the world have shown how ultra-nationalism, militarism, and authoritarianism have destroyed countless countries. We in the west should do more to stop this destruction because small problems, if left unchecked, can turn into massive crises down the line.

Welcome to Stardew Valley

"You've inherited your grandfather's old farm plot in Stardew Valley. Armed with hand-me-down tools and a few coins, you set out to begin

your new life. Can you learn to live off the land and turn these overgrown fields into a thriving home?" – Steam store page

Stardew Valley is a game created by Eric Barone aka "ConcernedApe," and he has done all the art, music, and sound effects himself. It's a pixel-art country-life RPG where you, the player, inherit a farm from your late grandfather, out in a coastal place called Pelican Town. There are many things to do, and many things to learn. How will you spend your time? The choice is entirely yours. We'll talk about this and more in this month's edition of Gamer Talk.

The Basics

Stardew Valley is very well received game, with overwhelmingly positive reviews on Steam and a 9.5/10 rating with IGN. It's for good reason, too. The game is amazing, and it's amazing because of its simplicity. There's a lot you can do but it's also not complicated. It's an RPG, a role-playing game, where you farm and just live your life. That's the whole point. While the game is incredibly detailed, those details aren't hard to understand.

The Gameplay

Stardew Valley is a farming simulator where you take care of your farm, forage, fish, befriend the community and so much more. All the aspects of the game are so simple, but so thoughtful

and detailed that it keeps things interesting. I like the simplicity. It's easy to understand and it makes *Stardew Valley* a good game to relax with. For the first portion of the game, you'll be focusing on restoring the community center. There's two ways to do it: the natural way or the Joja route. Whenever I play, I always go the natural way. This way, you get to experience more of the game while playing. It's a better way to learn everything about it, too. The Joja route happens when you buy a membership at the local Jojamart. Think "evil capitalist." That's basically it. Depending on whether you restore the community center yourself or sell your soul to the Joja company, most of the game focuses on what you do with the community center. After that you're free to do whatever you want. Mine all day? Focus solely on livestock?

Waste time? It's all up to you!

My Thoughts

I absolutely adore this game. There isn't one thing that I hate or even mildly dislike. I've played a total of 260 hours, which seems like a lot, but for a game like Stardew Valley that's hardly anything. It's a beautiful game, with beautiful art, music, characters, and story that all in-

Guy Ritchie's 1998 film Lock, Stock and Two Smoking Barrels is a shocking example of a small-time heist, and the big complications that sprout from it. In this high-tension film, a small-town card shark, Eddy, enters a sketchy poker match, and comes out owing

500k to the wrong crowd. Eddy and his unwillingly enlisted crew then have to make a lot of money, and quickly. Time is ticking, and their lives are at stake, so as their last resort they plan a heist.


The Future is Fungi

Many people have a pre-existing opinion that fungi are just organisms that rot our food and grow unpleasantly in the backyard, but these notions barely scratch the surface of what makes a fungus a fungus. On top of being a good source of nutrients, they also maintain soil conditions in our ecosystem through decomposition. Fungi are eukaryotic and heterotrophic organisms. Almost all fungi reproduce asexually through spores and although they

are considered a plant, the behaviour of certain fungi is very much extraordinary.

Recent research shows that fungi connect and communicate through electrical impulses similar to the firing of neurons. This indicates that while fungi may not have the ability for abstract thought like us humans, they can determine their actions in a manner similar to the function of a brain. The basic signals such as where to move to find a food source, or what environment is most beneficial, are an innate behaviour which the fungi use as needed.

In 2010, using yellow slime mold, researchers from Japan and the U.K mapped the area of the Tokyo railway system. They did this with the end goal of finding the most efficient route to each destination. The genus of the fungus used was Physarum, specifically Physarum polycephalic. It is an acellular organism and is capable of ingesting material through phagocytosis. When searching for a food source it can expand outwards until one is found. Only one branch of the expansion it sends out is most efficient, so it retracts the others, leaving the most effective route behind. Led by Toshiyuki Nakagaki, researchers placed food samples on each coordinate on the



map and left it for a few days. The resulting pattern was a strikingly similar pattern to the current railway route with only a few minor differences. The naturally occurring organism had solved a design problem all on its own. Shown by this incredible experiment, we can incorporate fungi into future architecture and design projects, to allow for an environmentally friendly practice, as well as a natural and convenient city layout method.

IVE I've Mine

Truly adored by the media, IVE has garnered media attention since their debut, with their unique concepts and refreshing music, An Yujin, Gaeul, Rei, Jang Wonyong, Liz, and Leeseo, the members of IVE, released their first extended play (EP) album *I've Mine* on October 13. The album had three singles, with staggered releases. The first

track, "Either Way, was released on September 25 and is a song with a dreamy synth and lyrical atmosphere, depicting the idea of being free from other people's gaze. With members like Jang Wonyoung constantly under fire, their fans, "Dives" speculate that the song is about the members finding their true selves amidst constant media attention. Their second single, "Off the Record" was released on October 6th. "Off the Record" contains a rhythmic beat, characterized by a groovy and heavy bass guitar. The lyrics discuss the desire to express honesty and intimacy in the late hours of the night, meant to remain "off the record" and away from the public eye. Potentially the most striking track from the group the third track, "Baddie", was released alongside the EP. "Baddie" details a dark charm executed through a strong beat and electric bass rhythm. Seventeenth Heaven

Following the release of their tenth EP album, "FML", on April 24th, 2023, Seventeen released their eleventh EP album Seventeenth Heaven on October 23rd. Seventeen, a K-Pop group ironically comprised of thirteen members, reflects the name Seventeen with their three subunits within the group, vocal, performance, and hip-hop. They explain their name "Seventeen" derives from their thirteen members, three teams, and themselves as a group. Seventeen. Seventeenth Heaven includes eight tracks, with a total play time of 26 minutes and 45 seconds. Members within the group produced and composed the tracks within the album, with member Woozi producing the EP, and his fellow members S.Coups, Hoshi, Wonwoo, Mingvu, and Vernon contributing to the lyrics of the songs. The EP expresses their celebration of the bands' career and has an upbeat production. Woozi explains that the album's title is derived from the term "seventh heaven," which "represents the state of extreme joy". Alongside

the musical aspect of the album, the release of the physical album draws a creative aspect to the release, releasing three sperate versions of the album. The first version, a 5:26 AM version

depicts the start of an imaginative festival at dawn; the second, a 2:14 PM version witnesses the festival in full swing; and the third, a 10:23 PM version presents the festival's finale. Introducing a creative aspect to the physical albums, the times chosen on the albums represent key achievements within the group's career. 5:26, or May 26th, representing the day the group debuted



with their song "Adore U" in 2015. 2:14, or February 14th appeals to "Carat Day," a day Seventeen celebrates the dedication and loyalty of their fans, "Carats" and 10:23, or October 23rd, representing the day the EP was released.

Taylor Swift 1989 (Taylor's Version)

Arguably the most influential singer of our time, the 12-time Grammy winner and the 46-time nominee, Taylor Swift announced the re-recording and re-release of her fifth studio album 1989, following the closing of the first leg of "The Eras Tour". 1989 was an era in Swifts' career in which she promoted a range of pop subgenres, including dream pop, synth-pop, electropop,



and more. Releasing some of the most popular hits of her career, Swift released the rerecorded version of the project on October 27th, 2023. The title was perhaps the most highlyanticipated of the six projects she has rerecorded,. When the album was first released nearly a decade ago, three of its singles "Shake it Off", "Blank Space", and "Bad

Mix It Up with Matilda

As every day gets colder, I wish I had a fresh plate of sweet treats to dunk in my hot chocolate and to pass around the table at family dinners. Instead of wishing, we can make that happen by following the recipe I've shared this month to keep you and your family happy and warm. Our recipe for the month will be a batch of bite size cinnamon buns. These cinnamon buns will have you making a second batch and filling your mouth with more!

For the dough: Starting with the dough cream together ¾ cup butter and both powdered and non-powdered sugars until you've reached a light and fluffy texture. Add the eggs plus the vanilla and mix well. Slowly add one cup of flour, baking powder and salt. After all that is mixed add the remainder of the flour and mix until you get a smooth soft dough. Flatten that dough into a thin disk and wrap in plastic wrap, set in the fridge for an hour.

For the filling: After that long wait, take out a small bowl and combine the brown sugar and the cinnamon. Separate the dough into two pieces and working with one piece at a time, roll the dough to about ½ inch thick and about 15 inches by 4 inches. Spread 2 the of butter gently on top of the dough. Sprinkle ½ of the cinnamon sugar mix and lightly press it in the dough. Take one long edge of the dough and start to roll it into a tight log. Do the same for the remaining dough, butter, and cinnamon sugar mixture.

Cutting the dough: Using a sharp knife, start by cutting 1-inch pieces, that should make about 15 cookies per log. Place each cinnamon roll 2 inches apart on a lightly greased baking sheet.

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees: Bake the cinnamon buns for 9-11 minutes for the best result (they should have a pale color to them still). Set the cinnamon buns on a cooling rack for 1-2 minutes before setting the glaze on them. While the buns bake that would be a great time to start the glaze.

For the glaze: Start by mixing the cream cheese and powdered sugar together until it is thick and smooth. You may want to use an electric mixer or a blender so it's less work for your arm. You're going to add vanilla and 1 thsp of milk. Continue to add the milk, ½ thsp at a time until the glaze has a thickness to it but still pourable. Drizzle glaze over the cooled off cinnamon buns and enjoy!

Your cinnamon buns are complete! You can now dunk every single one into your hot chocolate and stuff your mouth full of tasty, sweet cinnamon. This recipe will come in handy on those cold rainy days or if you need to give someone a gift or even to just snack on while you go about your day. Happy November Vikings!!!
