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
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Dear Readers,



Visit an organic orchard!

Apple picking has become a huge tradition for some people and is quite a fun experience that the whole family can enjoy, but if you decide to go apple picking with your family this fall make sure you go to an organic orchard. Organic orchards are much more energy efficient and have less pesticide residue than non-organic orchards which is better for the environment and thus, better for you! Some organic orchards that are close by, if you want to go apple picking, include Mackay Apple Orchard, Bostwick's U-Pick Apples, and Bostwick's Family Orchard (different from the one previously listed).

Compost your Pumpkins!

CBC states that every year more than 80,000 metric tonnes of pumpkins are produced in Canada each year, of these 80,000 tonnes two thirds are sold fresh to customers for Halloween, which are then thrown away. This is quite a large number of pumpkins that are wasted each year, and most of it is not disposed of in a climate friendly way as it is thrown away into the trash. To help increase the number of pumpkins disposed in a climate friendly way, instead of throwing the pumpkins into the trash you can compost them or bake the leftovers! AT HVHS, we feed our compost to local farm animals.

Make your own costume instead of buying a new one!

Did you know that 83% of costumes are made with non-recyclable oil-based plastics? According to Energy Live News that means that 2,000 tonnes of plastic (about 83 million plastic bottles) are being thrown into dumps because they were only worn once. So, this year instead of purchasing a new costume to only wear it once, maybe make one from your closet or go to your local thrift store and buy one from there.

If you do these three things not only will you still have a fun Halloween/Fall, but you will also help our climate by reducing the large mass of waste from traditional Autumn activities. While these tips are helpful for the fall, if you want more ways to help with our environment come to a Climate Action meeting! Enhypen 結-You-

Following the release of their fourth extended play (EP) album, *Dark Blood* on May 22nd, 2023, Enhypen released their third Japanese single ##-You- on September 4th. The single is a total of 9 minutes and 31 seconds with three tracks, one new and two rerecorded in Japanese, rather than the original Korean version and includes their new Japanese track, "BLOSSOM" alongside re-recorded songs "Bite me" and "Bills". "BLOSSOM" incorporates themes of love, longing, and growth, as the lyrics walk the listener through the relationship of two individuals, explaining the story of they are anxious to pursue a relationship. Olivia Rodrigo GUTS

The 3-time Grammy winner and 7-time nominee Olivia Rodrigo recently released her second studio album *GUTS*, on September 8th, 2023. The album was co-written and recorded by Rodrigo herself and Dan Nigro, the producer of her debut album *Sour* (2021). The album was conceived by Rodrigo in hopes of reflecting the process of

maturity she experienced as her teenage years closes promptly after the success of *Sour*. *GUTS* features a sonically diverse range of tracks, from ballads like "Lucy" to retro-inspired tunes such as "Ballad of a Homeschooled Girl." With

a combined total of 39 minutes and 18 seconds, the 12 songs from the album made their debut in the Hot 100's Top 40, with the main track, "vampire" reaching No. 1 on the chart.

Key Good & Great

Making his debut with one of K-Pop's most prolific and critically claimed acts SHINee in 2008, Key recently released his second solo mini-album *Good & Great* on September 11th, 2023. Key delves into the world of nostalgia as dance-pop and '80s

synthpop heavily influence the track list. Good & Great, is plentiful with disco and funk elements sprinkled throughout it, creating the same foot-tapping mood

his prior releases induce. The album remains cohesive with consistent beats and a heavy influence of dance-pop present throughout its six tracks, spanning over 19 minutes and 29 seconds. Mitski *The Land Is Inhospitable and So Are We*

After returning from her three-year hiatus from the music business, *The Land Is Inhospitable and So Are We* is the seventh studio album by American singer-songwriter Mitski, released on September 15th, 2023. Mitski refers to *The Land Is Inhospitable and So Are We* as her "most American album" with "the theme of love" being a dominating aspect in her lyrics. Recorded alongside producer Patrick Hyland at Bomb Shelter in Nashville and Sunset Sound in Los Angeles, Mitski arranged a 17-person choir and an orchestra, that feature on several tracks in the album. Teased by the release of the singles "Bug Like an Angel" and "Star" / "Heaven" in July and August of this year, the total length of the album is 32 minutes and 21 seconds, with 11 songs total.





"Destroyer of Worlds" The Science Behind the Atom Bomb

Robert J. Oppenheimer — I'm sure you've heard the name. With the summer blockbuster hitting theatres on July 21, the world has been re-introduced to a pursuit called the Manhattan Project. For those who don't know of the events that took place, the Manhattan Project was an undertaking during World War II, that resulted in the creation of a lethal atomic bomb. It was a top-secret WW2 government project, in which approximately 130,000 workers were employed, with the goal of constructing a weapon that would give the United States a tactical advantage.

Though the bomb was researched and designed by Oppenheimer, there were many scientists who aided in the manufacturing of the bomb. This included a man named Neils Bohr, who recognized that to start a chain reaction they would need to use urani-um-235 rather than uranium-238.

The only problem was that uranium exists more abundantly as uranium 238. The difference between the two being that U-238 does not undergo nuclear fission, and therefore cannot ignite the bomb. One of the biggest challenges that the scientists faced at the time, was separating these two isotopes. They differ by only three neutrons, but the time and resources consumed by separating the two is substantial. The manufacturing process took more time, due to the lengthy affair of obtaining enough U-235 to sustain the bomb.

The bomb relies on a neutron chain reaction to split the uranium (Little Boy) and plutonium (Fat man) atoms. The uranium atom absorbs the neutron, and fissions into two new atoms. When this happens, a large amount of energy is created, and the bomb is underway. To demonstrate a chain reaction similar to the one that took place, I have made a mock experiment. Using 4000 matches, I constructed a hollow ball with the head of the match facing inward. I filled the hollow inside with match head and attached a fuel-soaked string leading up to the core. My results demonstrate how the product of a reaction can spread the reaction, in turn accelerating the ignition process.

Materials used:

4000 matches Cardboard Scissors Scrap paper Ruler

125 or 5x25 package of glue sticks


Hot glue gun Smokeless gunpowder Gasoline Yarn Safety glasses Lighter

- 1. My first order of business was to cut out a cardboard circle measuring approximately 12 inches. I began to glue matches onto both sides of the cardboard.
- 2. By layering the match heads inward, the inside was getting thicker than the outside, so they began slanting down. I tore up scrap paper and glued it in between the matches to act as spacers, so it would keep its sphere shape.
- 3. Once I got half the sphere built, I began gluing more matches to the other side, leaving a small opening.

- 4. The ball was complete. I filled it with smokeless gunpowder so it would burn more rapidly. Then I glued together a chain of match heads leading to the core.
- 5. I set my ball on a metal pipe and set up my cameras.
- 6. Taking a long string of yarn, I soaked it in gasoline and quickly tied it to the chain of matches running up the pole.
- 7. I lit the end of the yarn, and watched it ignite.

Results:

The match ball lit slowly at the start, and quickly erupted into a ball of flame. It lasted for about 3 seconds and fizzled out. Each match spread the flame to the next match, and finally built up enough heat that the top flew off of the ball.



The process of nuclear fission looks similar. But instead of match to match, it's atom to atom.


Grade 12 student Brooklyn Loatman has started a petition to bring back Wednesday's study hall, an extended period that allowed students to catch up on work.

"A lot of people who take AP classes really appreciated that time. I have so much homework in every class and not a lot of time to get it done," she said.

Study hall, or extended home room, was started at the school in 2015. The extra long home room is beneficial for a variety of reasons. Not only does it provide an opportunity for students to catch up on homework, but it can also be used as a way to confer with classmates or teachers, organize book bags or even just read. Many teachers also found the extra time useful for tracking attendance or simply chatting with their homeroom students.

So, what happened to Wednesday study hall?

"In June of last year our leadership team, which is a mix of 15 teachers, administrators, guidance counselors, and department leaders, reviewed a handful of items that needed addressing or adjustment as we planned for the new school year," said Mr. McDade, HV's Principal. "This group felt that overall, the extended homeroom period was not being used effectively. The concern about extended HR was not a new issue, as the previous year the decision was made to dedicate the extended homeroom specifically to an academic study hall due to complaints that there were too many activities and distractions occurring during extended HR. After spending the 22-23 school year keeping the extended room protected as an undis-

tracted study hall, it still did not seem to be used effectively for academic purposes in the opinion of the leadership team."

Brooklyn hasn't spoken to the Leadership per se, but many teachers feel that the study hall is beneficial and have signed the petition. In talking to her classmates, Brooklyn also found that the majority of students were in favour of bringing it back. No one has refused to sign it.


While Brooklyn was inspired to start the petition for personal reasons she said, "It's a beneficial time for everyone because school is a dedicated place to work with less distractions than at home."

Mr. McDade thinks the petition is a great idea.

"Our civics and humanities programming, as well as our Viking Values, are proven to be effective when we see displays of the student body passionately and appropriately voicing their concerns and engaging their peers who might view issues similarly," he said. "I have also had a student meet with me directly to provide some deeper points pertaining to their argument that the extended HR should be re-established. I am reminding those who approach me about it that there are study hall opportunities during the two extended HR's that we are still having each month, those being on grade 9 Pod Day and also as a wellness Wednesday option. That said, we will certainly discuss the petition with the leadership team when we receive it."

At the time Harbour Views went to print, 163 students had signed the petition.

Top Trending Artists



The top trending tracks are 'Get


him back,' 'Lacy,' and 'Make the Bed.'


Communism in the 21st century



Welcome to Darkwood

"You are playing a challenging and unforgiving game. You will not be led by the hand. Respect the woods. Focus." – Darkwood loading screen

Darkwood is a game developed by Acid Wizard Studios. It's a top-down, story-rich survival horror game where the player is trapped in a forest by overgrown trees that are nearly impossible to cut down. Smart thinking is key when playing *Darkwood* because even one small mistake can lead to a night of misery. Between the gameplay, environmental storytelling, art and the lingering knowledge that any second could be your last skillfully, *Darkwood* creates a dread that stays with you throughout the entirety of the game. *Darkwood* is truly unlike any other indie game out there, which is why we'll be talking about it in this month's edition of Gamer Talk.

The Basics

Darkwood is developed by Acid Wizard Studios and was fully released on August 17th, 2017. It is widely available most places where games can be played. It's a top-down, story rich, survival horror game that takes place in the Soviet Bloc (Poland specifically) during the late 1980's. Its premise is simple. Something has infected the trees and forest in this area. It has caused them to grow so rapidly that cutting down even one branch is virtually impossible. The creatures have a new thirst for blood. The trees have grown so tall that the daylight is dim, and the night is pitch-black. Once you're in the Darkwood, it's impossible to get out. Or is it? Play the game, survive the woods, and see for yourself.

Survival horror is an interesting genre that, when done right, can create masterpieces such as *Darkwood*. Instead of relying on gore, or jump scares, survival horror gets its fear factor by making you fear for your life. It plays on the instinctual fear of death we all have as well as playing on our need to survive. It doesn't use many outside things to scare you; it simply plays on your preexisting fears, some of which you may not had until playing *Darkwood*.

I live surrounded by trees in the woods. Having to leave my house while it was dark out, alone, walking down my very long driveway is no longer a fun experience after playing this game.

In terms of being a survival horror game, *Darkwood* is not all that dissimilar to others of its genre. The map is randomly generated, there are multiple difficulties and endings possible, but that's as far as I'd place it in terms of other survival horror games. Unlike many other games, *Darkwood* has no quest markers. There is a story that is very important to the game; it is mostly optional. There is no hand holding. You, as the player, will not be told what to do.

You can choose to take the suggestions from various characters but if you'd rather just camp out in the hideout and fight for your life, you are free to do so. That's what makes the gameplay so interesting.

The Gameplay

Part of Darkwood's uniqueness is greatly from its gameplay and game mechanics. The mechanics are simple however there are many of them. All of them help with Darkwood's atmosphere and ever-lasting dread, however.

As mentioned previously, Darkwood is a top-down game. What does this mean? It means you have a birds-eye view of the player character and the game environment. In most games, top-down means you're able to see all of the player character, such as in Stardew Valley, but Darkwood's birdseye view is a true birds-eye view. You see the top of the player character and just the top. This applies to every character in the game. The only time you get to see what they look like normally is when speaking to them and their sprite is in front of you. The birds-eye view allows you to see all of the environment. This is partially true for Darkwood. While you do technically see everything, what the player character perceives is only in a small frame of where your character is actually looking. The cool thing about this is that you can still see objects move outside of the view. What moved them? It's up to you to assume the worst. You'll probably be right. I remember my second night in Darkwood. I saw the dresser I was using as a door barricade be pushed out of the way from where I placed it. I couldn't see what it was, but I could hear the horrible sound of the floor scraping and the growls of the beast that would later take my life. Words cannot truly describe the feeling of raw fear that this invoked in me.

Darkwood has many game mechanics, average ones that you can find in many other games, but they all have a sort of unique twist to them. Trading, for example, is not done with currency (money means nothing in Darkwood) but through reputation. Each night you survive, you're rewarded with a certain amount of reputation depending on what hideout you've stayed at. The more dangerous, the more reputation. Items can also be traded for reputation. Shiny stones in particular make the traders happy. There's one trader who deals exclusively in arms (as in weapons) and ammo. He is known as the Wolfman. He will be very important later.

Other mechanics include the map, gossiping, crafting, the skills and combat. The map gets filled out at you explore more area, however you never know your exact location. Gossiping with NPCs (non-player characters) can provide useful information and in some cases progress the game. Crafting is an essential part of the game that you quickly become reliant on. Skills are a unique thing. You gain skills not through actually doing anything but rather through cooking certain things you find in the forest. Most of these will be mushrooms. Once you have the necessary amount of "essence" as it's called, you will inject it into yourself and are able to choose the skill (and downside. It must be balanced) you would like. Every time you inject yourself with the essence, the player goes on a small acid-trip experience. I don't fully understand these trips. I can tell you that they aren't enjoyable though.

The hideouts are the key to surviving in Darkwood. They provide a safer zone during the day as well as your only chance of survival at night. There are three hideouts in the main map of *Darkwood*, one in the Dry Meadow (least dangerous), one in the Old Woods (medium dangerous), and one in the Silent Forest (very dangerous). They each have workbenches, generators, wood saws, wells and stoves. Workbenches allow you to craft more complex things and provide storage for extra materials. Generators light up the hideout. Light helps keep out enemies and provide a small comfort during the night. It is important to keep generators fuelled and off when you're away from the hideout. Most of the gasoline you collect in the game goes to keeping the generators going. Wood saws do as the title says: saw wood. You can turn logs into planks, which can be used for barricades, repairing hideouts, and crude weapons when needed. Wells, when fixed, offer a small amount of bonus health and energy once per day. They aren't needed, but they're certainly a very useful thing to have. Stoves, when lit, will emit their special gas that make the hideout a "safe" place to spend the night. You cannot cook on the stoves during nighttime.

It is essential that you keep the stove lit or else you will not survive. Point blank. Always make sure the stove it lit.

Death is frequent and expected in the *Darkwood*. If you're out scavenging and get killed (which you will be), half of your inventory will be lost and a marker on your map will be placed in order to regain your items. If you die at night while in a hideout? Tough luck. No reputation for you. In certain difficulties you have a limited number of lives before the save file you're playing in is gone. In the hardest difficulty when you die, you're gone for good. Deaths will most often happen at nighttime during the nighttime events. This can be any number of things and really depends on where you hideout during the night. The nighttime event usually consists of an enemy of some sort breaking in to kill you. This is where traps will save your life, because the faster you're able to get rid of them, the better chance you have of survival.

At the end of each night, an in-game hour before the sun is fully up, music plays, hauntingly beautiful and heavenly music. Hearing this music means you survived another night. The screen will fade to white, then morning will start. This is when the player gets to breathe, relax for a bit, and process the horror you were just victim too. In the mornings, you get a small amount of comfort. Time is on a temporary pause to allow you to trade with the trader, turn off the generator and craft anything you need to before the cycle starts anew. The small mercies of the game make all the suffering worth it. Kinda. If not the small mercies, the story does.

My Personal Thoughts

I love *Darkwood*. It is by far one of my favourite horror game experiences, and I'm so, so sad that I won't be able to experience it for the first time again. All the characters are so cool and piercing together the lore and the story was so fun. It's scary, not overly so, but enough that it lingers with you. I love the art and the environments. I loved the scavenging for materials, and I loved fighting for my life. It's a beautiful game and I'm so happy I got the chance to play it. That being said, it does have its flaws.

All of the nights in chapter two are extremely difficult. It got to the point where I wasn't sure I could keep going with them because I was starting to get more annoyed with it than anything. I did keep going, because I wanted to know more about the story and find out what all was happening, but there were points it was tedious. Now, the game is about survival, and it very clearly says that "you are playing challenging and unforgiving game" which I completely understand but there were times that it felt cruel. Overall, however, I adore this game. I went with the Wolfman's path in chapter and then the disabled man's path in chapter two.

I think about this game daily. It's captivated me unlike any other game has and I highly recommended that fans of the survival horror genre play it if they ever get the chance. I can almost guarantee that you will not regret it.
