Applications being accepted for the 2012 French Summer Camp

The main objective of the summer camp is to give students the opportunity to strengthen their French language and expand their understanding of French culture by being immersed in a French learning environment.

Duration: Approximately 4 weeks (July 1st – July 27th) Location: Université de Moncton Deadline for Application: April 13, 2012

Overview of Program

The summer camp focuses on developing students' language skills in the areas of speaking, listening, reading and writing. Students are organized in learning groups based on their language proficiency; an assessment is administered on the first day of the program. The goal is to keep class sizes small (15 to 18 students) and homogeneous with respect to language proficiency. Students participate in a variety of learning experiences, such as oral exercises, debates, discussions and educational games to improve their oral language skills. All instructional materials are provided. The teachers are experienced in creating a positive and engaging learning environment. Classroom activities are complemented by cultural and social activities. These allow students to strengthen their language skills in relevant and practical situations. The communicative approach which promotes the integration of all four basic language skills (i.e., listening, speaking, reading and writing) is also reflected in these experiences.

A team of monitors also work with the students during the program. These individuals are chosen because of their expertise as strong communicators and facilitators. Most of the monitors are students at the Université de Moncton and are familiar with the facilities. During the academic year, the monitors are involved in extra-academic campus activities (e.g., varsity sports, radio campus, student council, and coaching). The monitors are all highly skilled and the activities for which they are responsible are well planned and executed with the overall safety, and linguistic and social development of the students in mind. All activities are geared towards reinforcement of the French language and culture.

Campus staff offers full support to students who are immersed in the French language and culture. The goal is to make the students' stay at the Université de Moncton an enjoyable and memorable experience.

Lodging

Students live in residence during the 4-week program at the Université de Moncton. Male and female students are assigned rooms on separate floors of the residence. Two students share a room for the duration of the program. A student may ask for a specific roommate, but there is no guarantee that he/she will be placed with the person requested.

Eligibility

A total of 100 students who have completed Grade 9 or 10 by June 2012 will be chosen to participate in this program. The distribution of seats is determined on a per capita basis for each school district. In support of the provincial goal for second language proficiency, 60% of the seats are reserved for students in Post-Intensive or Core French and 40% for French immersion students.

Selection

School district French second language (FSL) learning specialists review applications received from schools and forward successful applicants to the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development respecting the number of allocated seats and the date of receipt of applications. First-time applicants are given provincial priority. Names can be submitted to be placed on a provincial waiting list. For further details, please contact the school district FSL learning specialist.

Funding for the Program

The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development funds the program. Funding covers the cost of the tuition, a room and meals in residence, excursions and required instructional materials. As the overall cost per student is significant, there is an expectation that students will participate fully and remain for the full duration of the program. Parents/guardians should be sensitive to their child's readiness to be away from home for this length of time.

Student and Parent/Guardian Responsibilities: Travel to and from Moncton, spending money, and \$100 deposit

The \$100 deposit is returned if:

a) a student withdraws before May 31 or b) he/she completes the full program.

The deposit is forfeited if a student: a) withdraws after May 31st, b) does not show up on registration day, or c) decides to leave or is asked to leave the program early. Instructions for students/parents

The application form must be completed and returned to a student's French teacher with a \$100 cheque, dated April 13th, 2012, and written to "The Minister of Finance - New Brunswick". Money orders or cash are not accepted. The application form and deposit (cheque) must be given to the French teacher on or before April 13, 2012.

If a student is selected to participate in the program and for some reason is unable to attend, he or she should notify Marc Vienneau as soon as possible (see contact information below). This allows a student on the waiting list to participate in the program. There will be so many great things going on this season, all of you are going to want to know about it!



Zoe Bell-Smith, Jacob Durdan, and Seth Johnson are not only starring in our school's musical *Phantom of the Opera*, they have accomplished something really amazing. With help and support from Mr.Molloy, Ms. Sanderson and Ms. BL the trio auditioned for Canadian theatre arts schools and all three have been accepted.

Seth and Jacob both auditioned for Holland College's School of Performing Arts at the Confederation Centre in Charlottetown, PEI.

"The program at Holland College is really geared towards training young people in theatre arts with a view to preparing them for larger schools in Toronto or Vancouver," explains Ms. B-L. "It connects them to the right people."

The boys' audition consisted of ensemble dancing and singing, a short monologue and a private singing audition."

Seth took Ms. B-L's advice to "have fun and enjoy the process" at the audition. "I wanted to know if I could make it," he said.

As for Jacob, he didn't let his nerves get the best of him. "As it turned out, there was no need to be worried. The theatre professionals were really laid back and friendly."

Despite the fact that both Seth and Jacob were accepted on the spot ("absolutely unusual for this to have happened," explained Ms. B-L") both students are struggling with the decision.

"I really want to go," he said. But Jacob was also offered a \$25,000 entrance scholarship to UNB, a lot of money to turn down. If he does opt for Plan B, he would study Chemical Engineering.

Seth is in the same predicament. "I'm leaning towards going to PEI, but it's a big decision and I haven't 100% made up my mind." If Seth doesn't choose Theatre School he's considering an Arts Degree with a view to becoming a teacher.

Zoe auditioned for Randolph Academy for Performing Arts in Toronto. Randolph is one of the top three performing arts schools in the world and number one in Canada. Zoe auditioned in Halifax, the only applicant from New Brunswick.

"I felt majorly nervous before my audition because I'd never auditioned for a school before and I didn't know what to expect or how old the other people auditioning were going to be," said Zoe.

The audition process consisted of a dance, a slide show, monologue and then private singing. Zoe was

also interviewed and had to submit a 200 word personal statement.

"I liked how the school really focused on the fact that you didn't already have to be a triple threat to get in. The school was committed to teaching you how to become a triple threat—they look for acting ability because they can teach you to sing and dance," Zoe said.

Zoe is 95% sure she'll accept Randolph's placement offer and will head off to Toronto in the fall. The original plan was to head to St. Thomas to pursue an Arts Degree and audition again in a year—but it looks like that isn't necessary.

Whatever Zoe, Jacob and Seth do in the future, we've been extremely lucky to have enjoyed their tremendous gifts over their four years at HVHS.
