





CBC Anchor Harry Forestell visits Journalism 120

On Thursday November 12th, Ms. McDonald's Journalism class was lucky enough to receive a special visit from Harry Forestell from CBC news. Forestell discussed a variety of topics including news stories that shaped journalism today, stories that inspired him and what it takes to be a good journalist. The class learned that Forestell began his journalism career at St. Thomas University and then eventually went on to become the editor of the school newspaper *The Aqunian* and was a rival to Ms. McDonald herself, who was the editor of UNB's student paper *The Brunswickan*. This was how the two became friends.

After Forestell graduated from STU he studied journalism at Carleton University in Ontario and was then offered an internship at CBC radio. He moved back and forth between Canada and the UK where he worked for the BBC for a while and then became the UK correspondent for CBC. Currently, Forestell is the host of CBC New Brunswick News at 6.

Mr. Forestell told the class about many of the different news stories that shaped modern journalism. One of the biggest stories would be the Watergate Hotel story which resulted in President Richard Nixon resigning. This story is one that inspired Forestell to consider journalism as a possible career choice. The Tiananmen Square protest of 1989, which caused a number of deaths on June 4th when the military moved in to clear out the political protest that was taking place within the square, also had a significant impact on the news. Back in '89, this story was half a world away and it took days for journalists in Canada to hear about it. Now, however, within a matter of minutes thanks to technology it is much easier to receive information.

Forestell wrapped up his talk with a story that hit much closer to home: Ashley Smith. Smith was a young 14-year-old girl who had been arrested for a misdemeanor and, unfortunately, didn't end up leaving police custody until her death at 19. Forestell shared this story because he said it was a much harder story to handle. After Smith died in prison, he went to interview her mother. He explained that it was always important to tell the truth.

Forestell left students with three pieces of advice: "Always ask why, a story isn't told until you tell it, and information can always come from different sources."

"I've been on the team for three years and we've made it to provincials each year," said Madeleine Sundblad, graduating co-captain. "In the past, we always lost our first game and


weren't able to advance. As it turns out, it was the two second place teams that ended up on the field for the big game and it was our lucky day."


Go Vikings! Cheerleading 2015-16

the party (of course) and he sang *Happy Birthday*, which was apparently awesome (maybe for some people) Safe to say, she had a great night.






Mason admits that it wasn't until about half-way through grade eleven that he started to take his future a little more seriously.

Playing it safe online

The Internet is something we use on a daily basis. We interact with friends, family and even with complete strangers. There are many online activities which we participate in, one of which is sharing; the biggest reason why the Internet is where it is today is because of all the content we, the users, provide. Whether it be photos of your recent vacation, friends, or chatting with people in messages or com-

ments, we share nearly everything we do online without a second thought. Because of this, you could be putting sensitive information out without realizing that you are. In today's society, it's more important than ever to be aware of the data you spread online, not only because of hackers, but because of people who may try and track you in person. If someone got hold of your private information it could spell disaster for you. Below are just a few things you can do to protect your identity and safety while on the internet.

In order to secure your online accounts, a separate password should be used for each, especially email and banking. Avoid common words, names, and numbers when creating passwords. Don't sign up for every newsletter and website out there. Doing so will only spread the chances of having your information out in places you don't want it to be in. Having

separate email accounts is also a good idea. One for important things such as school, work, banks and one for social media or gaming sites. This helps keep information separate. Pay attention to any links you click in private messages or emails. If you think it may be dangerous, don't click, just delete.



The most important thing you can do is just be aware of what you do. Think before adding someone. Think before posting a photo or status. Make sure it doesn't contain any personal information. You, and only you, can decide what infor-

mation gets out on the internet. Don't think that a website or service will protect you either, even if they say they will. This has been proven time after time. Case in point: the 2011 PlayStation hack, where people's emails and credit card numbers were leaked. Because a lot of you probably use Snapchat, they had their database leaked back in January of 2014, exposing tons of passwords and phone numbers. Once something is online, it stays there; even if you're told something is not stored, it's always false. This isn't, by any stretch, a comprehensive guide to protecting yourself but it's a good way to start.

The first thing you will want to do is check all security and privacy settings on all websites and services. This includes not only websites but also desktop applications and mobile apps. You will want to make sure that you thoroughly go through each option and set your profiles to private if possible. Make sure that any posts are only seen by you and people on your contact lists. This would, of course, be pointless if you're the type of person who adds everyone to your contact list. You should only be adding people you are close friends with or family. Verifying that the person you're adding is a real person is good practice as well. Some things you shouldn't include on your profiles? Date of birth, phone number, address. The biggest mistake someone can make is sharing their address or location with
