

We started off our year with a Welcome Back barbeque followed by a game of Amazing Race on September 22nd. Thanks to all who came out and made the event a fun time for all!



As all of you should have noticed, the administration has changed the bus load up zone by repaving and putting sidewalks around the perimeter. Previously we had a different entrance near the teacher's parking lot, and an exit by what is known as the student's parking lot. Now there is a shared entrance/exit for the buses, on the student parking lot side.


"I've been fighting to have this done for six years," says Mr. Morgan. "It's always been a safety issue with students running towards their buses as traffic was flowing through the parking lot. Now, the students line up along the sidewalk and enter and exit the buses along the sidewalk instead of in the middle of the parking lot. It also eliminates students driving through the bus parking lot, especially when it's so crowded. I believe it's safer now."

This year's route has been improved because previously students stood where the buses were meant to be loading, there is now a designated place for the students to stand. In the past, students may have had trouble seeing that their bus was there because busses or students might have been turned around. Now it is easy to see when each bus arrives. This has improved both safety and efficiency for the buses and the students.

It is a great and well implemented addition to the school, and we applaud those who took part in the design and the construction of it.



In a series of fundraising initiatives, we hope to raise a total of \$7000 to support this great cause. The money that we raise will be going directly towards protecting and rehabilitating families affected by Joseph Kony's rebel army.

The defense got things going early with a goal line stand in the first quarter. Beale also had a fumble recovery Saturday while McGregor Knox had an interception. Connor Duffley had two sacks on the Sonics quarterback, while Bryce Johnson and Elliot Vautour were in on several tackles.

Last season the Vikings were one of the youngest teams, with only four seniors, in the ten man conference. They struggled through a 0 and 6 season. With an older and more experienced line up this year, the team is 1 and 1 early in the 7 game season. Eight of the 10 teams in the ten man conference make it to the playoffs and the improved Vikings feel they have a chance to make the top eight.


