



All three athlete did a great job at provincials. Jill Beck came home with a provincial first place win in javelin. Way to go team!



This is the 6<sup>th</sup> time they have brought Lucy back on the network. In December 2013, CBS aired the Christmas episode and the episode "Lucy's Italian Movie" both in living colour. And again the following Christmas with the second episode being "Job Switching" and then in May, 2015, they brought the *I Love Lucy Superstar Special* to TV with the episodes "LA at Last" and "Lucy Meets Superman." Later in the year, the Christmas episode again, along with the episode "Lucy Does A TV Commercial" and now, they brought us "Lucy at Grauman's" and "Lucy Meets John Wayne." For those who don't know the series, Lucy Ricardo is a kooky red head who is married to a Cuban bandleader named Ricky Ricardo. Lucy is always trying to get into Ricky's act even when he tells her not to because it will turn into nothing but trouble, which it always does. Any scheme she plans, she always tries to bring her friends and landlords, Fred and Ethel Mertz, into the mix. The series originally aired on CBS from 1951 to 1957 and then spent 3 years as the one hour *Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz Show* until 1960. It is the only show to never officially be taken off TV. It has constantly been in reruns ever since the last episode aired. I could go on forever about this show. But I hope you had a chance to watch it. If not, your grandparents probably have it PVR'd. 



## Street Fight

The lights above glint off the brass knuckles coming at my face and, in that moment, the lights are gone and I feel a deep throb in my eye. It may even be below my eye, but I'm too dazed to tell. A chill runs along the right side of my body and I think it's because I've gone numb. Only, when my vision focuses, I realize I'm not numb at all; I'm pressed to the cool pavement with the weight of another chick holding me down. I grind my teeth, spitting out the fragments of a rock.

"You got anything to say now, Blue?" Zed's voice rings in my ear, and I lift my fingers to brush the side of my jaw, and tap something sticky. She must've busted my eardrum.

"Yeah," I say, struggling to squirm free, "word of advice. Using brass knuckles gives the impression that you can't fight." Another face full of metal. "Fight like a woman," I cough.

This time, when the brass knuckles hit my face, they're cold against my teeth and I feel them rattle like chains. The crowd screams. I knew by her punches that she's getting angrier, because each one becomes more powerful than the last and a part of me wishes she'd hold back. I was losing to Zed, and I wasn't going to be one of those people to deny it because hey, you lose some, you win some.

At least when I have a rematch with her, I'll know that she stepped before she punched, and her eyes flicker to my fists when she went to kick. Zed is the most brutal street fighter you'd ever come across; emotionless, hell, she doesn't even *know* what a conscience is, and she's got a killer left hook. I'm not ready to fight her but I didn't have a choice, did I?

When someone isn't ready, that isn't enough to stop her. With an eye swollen shut, helpless on my back and Zed on my chest, I stretch my arm out along the pavement, searching for anything I can use. One thing my father taught me growing up a street fighter (after he stubbornly accepted my life style), was that anything and I repeat, *anything* can be of use, so use it. Obviously my father didn't follow his own advice or else he wouldn't be stuck in a wheelchair for the rest of his pathetic life.

The alley is filled with junk. I touch a shoe, a wrapper, and something mushy, I assume it's a banana peel. Relief swims through me when my fingers wrap around a broken brick.

Grunting, I swing my arm towards her head, and catch her temple with the corner of the brick, a weak blow because I lack momentum. In a daze, she falls off me. I use this as my chance, and I clumsily get back on my feet, the crowd moving with me, like they can't get close enough. Their shouts only raise in volume. My busted ear begins to throb to the beat of my heart.

"Come on, Blue!" Someone from the crowd hollers. "Get up and give that bitch what she deserves!"

"Zed, break her ribs!"

"Punch her in the face, Blue!"

Facing Zed, I watch as a trickle of blood slips into her eye. She climbs to her feet. Snarling, she wipes it away and bares her teeth.

“You want a real fight? That’s what you’re looking for, right?” I ask breathlessly. My cheek starts to sting. She hit me hard early on, and I won’t be surprised if she fractured my cheekbone. It sure felt like she did.

“You know the rules. Fight fair, Zed, or it isn’t a fight at all.” Street fighting is a sport, and like any other sport, you have to know the place and the time. Clearly, Zed likes to get things done early, without any attempts at professionalism. How were we expected to get performance points when this fight was motivated by anger, and not by the competition? Zed didn’t care about the points, but I did. Since I’m my father’s daughter, I have a reputation to uphold, and my reputation won’t be being a fraud because of a chick with anger issues.

We circle each other, and I watch for any movement, careful not to flinch. Flinching deems you hesitate and afraid and a street fighter can’t afford to be either. I’ve been a street fighter for a couple years now, and that was the first thing I was taught. Don’t show weakness.

“You think a street fight is ever going to be fair?” She hollers back. I shrug. She has a point. I assume that’s why people call it a street fight, because the streets are never fair to anyone. Every corner has the power to light the fire inside you that is anxiety and fear.

“Midnight” –her eyebrow raises in confusion at my words- “we fight at Dullings, behind the diner, no brass knuckles. Understand?”

“We’re finishing this now,” she says. She reminds me of a wild animal, hair in knots like a nest, face bloody, jaw tight. I imagine her heart is pounding just as hard as mine is because of the adrenaline. Who knows, maybe it isn’t even because of the adrenaline, but from sheer enjoyment.

“No, we’re not. You’ll fight fair when we fight, or I don’t fight at all.” I pause, carefully considering the words I need to fish for in order to convince her. “And we all know how much you’d love to shatter my teeth.” She smirks in response. Of course this is what she wants, it’s what Zed lives for, all she trains for. It’s paid off, since she’s the best. Kudos to her.

“Am I clear?” I ask her as I itch one of the deeper scratches on my arm (there’s never a day Zed *doesn’t* wear nails as sharp as a bear’s claws), the arm that’s inked up. I’d gotten a tattoo a few years ago and came to hate it as I got older. After stealing a tattooing kit, I used the gun on myself to cover the tattoo with nothing but a blue rectangle. It looks like a mismatched piece of skin that doesn’t belong, and it coats a good portion of my forearm. It’s the reason for my name.

Now, it’s not only blue but red, too.

Zed puts her fists down as a sign of agreement, nostrils flaring. I follow suit.

“Clear,” she says. Fighters didn’t particularly enjoy being publicly berated by other fighters. I will admit, it surprises me that she’d give in so easily.

When she grinds her teeth in what I assume is frustration, they’re tainted red and I wonder if mine look the same. I slip into my hoodie that’s now decorated with dirty footprints. Ah, the luxuries of a street fight. You get your teeth knocked out, and your favourite sweater covered in dirty footprints. You’d think the crowd would be a little more respectful, especially since we, the fighters, give them the fights they crave so badly. Everyone loves a good one and tonight, that’s what I’m going to give them. Consider it a gift.

“Hey, Bea,” Zed calls. My jaw tightens. I hate that name. You give yourself a street fighter name and it’s considered rude if you didn’t use it when addressing your opponent. She’s just trying to anger me so I change my mind. Well, unlike her, I have control of my emotions.


I say, “That’s not my name.”


