


Beyond The Last Page



The Field Guide to the North American Teenager by the Canadian-raised Ben Philippe is the story of a black, French, hockey loving Canadian named Norris who moves to sweltering hot Texas. He thinks he will hate it there, and to be fair, he does for a long time but who wouldn't hate leaving everything you've ever known for some city in the States? But his hatred slowly disappears when he starts to get to know some of the kids from his school, starting with beta cheerleader Madison, loner Liam, and finally Aatari the cool photographer who he immediately gets a crush on. Basketball season is officially over at HVHS as two out of our four teams made it to the regional qualifiers and fought till the end for the championship banner. The JV girls finished out an incredible season with an impressive effort at the Provincial tournament at KVHS, just one weekend after the JV boys fought valiantly in the same gym for the regional qualifiers.

The Lady Vikings did end up in the provincial championship but not before dominating the qualifying weekend 15 days prior. The journey began by defeating STM 68-20 with top scorers Jessica Palmer (11 points), and Haley Palmer (10 points) leading the charge and giving them confidence for their next game against Leo Hayes. This also resulted in a 64-44 win led by Piper Cobham and Haley Palmer with 11 pts each. The only loss of the weekend came against FHS with a final score of 56-39.

On day one of the provincial championships, the Lady Vikings started off strong defeating Moncton High 56-54! Top scorers were Haley Palmer and Piper Cobham with 17pts each, along with Adelle Read bringing down 12 rebounds! That night, the girls played a tough matchup against Miramichi but came up short in the end with a score of 58-70. Top scorer was Haley Palmer with 17 pts!

They began day two with a hard-fought battle against FHS in the semifinals. Despite the incredible effort from the Vikings they were defeated 46-75. Top scorers were Jessica Palmer and Haley Palmer with 11pts each! Top rebounders were Kylie Dorcas and Piper Cobham with 9 rebounds each.

The JV Boys also demonstrated their competitiveness in the Southern conference by qualifying for the regional tournament with the third seed. Despite having a tough matchup against Fredericton High School, the Vikings competed hard and gave it their all. Unfortunately they came up just short for both games after a loss to KVHS on the second day of competition.

The Varsity Boys team also finished their season off on a high note --despite not making the playoffs-- when they earned 3rd place in the ESA (École Saint-Anne) Bracket Challenge in Fredericton. In the first round, the Vikings dominated Carleton North by 20 points before losing a tough quarter final matchup to Leo Hayes. Leading scorer was Ethan Crowley with 20 points. With a 1-1 record on Saturday, the boys earned a spot in the bronze medal game on Sunday against Oromocto High. The Vikings won that game in convincing fashion thanks to a 29-point performance from Gerry Bidgood.

We are very proud to say that HVHS has four very talented and competitive programs and we are only looking up from here!

Lift Yr. Skinny Fists like Antennas to Heaven by Godspeed You! Black Emperor is as genius as its title is pretentious. The album perfects what little known band Slint started in the 90s with their underground breakout album *Spiderland*. Both of these albums are undeniably masterpieces, and both deserve to be shown to a greater audience.

In 1991 Slint released *Spiderland*. It was an album that was both methodical and chaotic, frantically jumping from quiet haunting guitar melodies and spoken word poetry, to screaming guitars and strained vocals. Look no further than the opening track, "Breadcrumb Trail." The track opens with soft spoken vocals and quickly devolves into loud, post-hardcore influenced madness. The final track of the album Good Morning, Captain is the melancholic tale of a sailor who abandoned his family for the sea only to be rejected when returning home. The last minutes of the song act as a cathartic crescendo for the whole album as the singer screams "I'm

sorry, I miss you" over blaring guitars and drums. Sadly Slint broke up soon after as the members all went on to university.

Where Slint is depressed and violent, GY!BE searches for hope within despair. Their first album: F#Infinity was a haunting depiction of a capitalist apocalypse, opening with the forever famous and mildly edgy meme-able lines: "The car is on fire, and there is no driver at the wheel". This moody melancholy was then perfected in their followup Lift Yr. SKinny Fists Like Antennas to Heaven. Instead of transition from calm to storm in the blink of an eye, LYSF transitions as beautifully and elegantly as a dancer between the too, offering hope, sorrow, and beauty with its beautifully layered and composed instrumentation.

Both albums are not necessarily easy to listen to. Slint's *Spiderland* experiments with strange time signatures, dissonant screams, and cacophonous guitars, whereas LYSF is only four tracks long and is about an hour and a half long. However, if you are willing to sit back and let yourself drift into the haunting, beautiful, and rich landscapes these albums paint you will have an experience you'll never forget.

To get the bad news out of the way first, the "grandfather of metal" Ozzy Osbourne, once again has become a victim to his own poor health and has been forced to cancel the rest of his two-year farewell tour, No More Tours. This may come as a surprise to some fans, but many long-time fans have been aware of Osborne's health issues. Osborne's health has declined in the last decade from drug abuse and all-around recklessness. At the age of 71 years old, it is uncertain how much time Ozzy has to reschedule his tour.

On the lighter side, Indie artist Right Away, Great Captain! has released his first record in over seven years. This new album, *I Am Not Me*, is a compilation of live and previously unreleased tracks from concept-trilogy he released over a decade ago. This trilogy is a masterpiece telling the story of a young 17th century man who discovers his wife having an affair with his brother. After learning this news, he embarks on a long sailing journey instead of confronting her. The music is an arrangement of feeling and encounters that the narrator endures throughout his long journey. *I Am Not Me* is available everywhere now.
