


This week I watched the movie *Divergent*, a cinematographic adaptation of Veronica Roth's award winning novel directed by Neil Burger. This film follows Beatrice "Tris" Prior (Shailene Woodley) who lives in a dystopian future where everyone is divided into one of five different faction groups based on personality type and values. The different factions consist of Abnegation, which values selflessness, Amity, which values peace, Candor, which values honesty, Dauntless, which values bravery, and Erudite, which values intelligence. Beatrice has grown up in Abnegation but is now faced with the choice of staying with her birth faction, or completely redefining herself by switching to one of the other four. However, when she takes the personality test, she finds out that she is Divergent, meaning that she doesn't fit in to any of the five categories. She must now hide her divergence, as the government is systematically killing off all of those who don't fit into this faction system.

Having previously read the *Divergent* book series, I had very high expectations for this movie. In general, I was satisfied with the portrayal and I was happy that the movie stuck to the plot. I found Shailene Woodley to be one of the highlights of the movie as she did an excellent job portraying Tris as she went through the different emotional states that accompanied the book. She captured the fearful yet daring personality of the character as she triumphed through peril, not because of her particular physique or skill set, but because of her indomitable and self-sacrificial character. The first half of this movie was by the far the best as it allowed us to finally experience the flare-up of these characteristics. The visual effects in this movie were also well done but they take care not to overdo it and to allow the plotline to tell the story.

Going into the film, I somewhat expected the series to play out like The Hunger Games, where a very strong story is taken and marketed to a wide young audience. The only issue with this was that the novel did not lend itself as easily to becoming a movie script. Many of the novel's high points came from the emotional revelations that happened to Tris as she tried to decide who she was. This is hard to portray on a cinematographic level and I feel that Neil Burger was simply not able to do it. I also disliked how the movie seemed to flash by certain moments that were critical to the plot of the novel. Perhaps this was to cut down on the movie's 2 hour and 20 minute runtime, but it left the film feeling rushed. Scenes like Al's betrayal of Tris, which led to so much emotional turmoil for her in the book, were brushed over, seemingly to shorten the movie. There was nothing particularly fantastic about the way this film was presented that made it stand out, and since I was already familiar with the plotline, a lot of the movie felt tedious. Great movies should be enjoyable even if you know how they end, and I felt that this film simply lacked this factor.

All in all, this was a movie that held true to the storyline of its literary predecessor but lacked the luster that accompanied the book. I would give it 3.5 stars out of 5 and would recommend it to anyone who likes tHarry Potter or Hunger Games - like movies that are geared towards adolescent viewers.

## Oom pah pah: Oliver! is a smashing success

Anyone that knows me knows that I love film, plays, and musicals. I love being able to scoot down in my seat and watch scenes unfold before my eyes. It's almost voyeuristic, like looking into somebody's very dramatized life from the audience, and that's what I like about it.

Oliver! tells the somewhat grim tale of a young orphaned boy named, what a surprise, Oliver! We follow him through the streets of 19th century London, as he gets into all kinds of trouble (really though, the musical opens with him asking for food! Who does that? What a little rebel!) I've never been a big fan of the film (mainly because it scared me half to death as a child) and I have never read the book. I thought it was a bit of a solemn choice and needless to say, I wasn't that excited about it. However, I think that Ms. Bossé and Ms. Sanderson succeeded in turning it into a very up beat and exciting musical. The dark scenes are still quite hard-hitting but I guess I just linked musicals to leg kicking and chorus lines. Oliver! is built around many themes including loneliness and finding a place to belong.

Visually, I give *Oliver!* the number one spot out of all of the HVHS musicals that I've seen. The show featured so many rich and warm colours, textures, and patterns and the composition of the cast and props on the stage was endlessly pleasing to look at. As for the lighting, it was sharp and clean, and a simple colour change gave a scene a whole new atmosphere. The costume crew, under the direction of Mrs. Johnson, created and organized dozens of costumes, each of which were either convincingly dingy or crisp and sophisticated.

I really feel like I don't even need to talk about the acting. It's no surprise that Harbour View is packed with very talented students. Props to David Darrah (Oliver) for appearing much younger and more orphan-like than he is in real life and for being a great character to root for; Ethan Gaunce (Mr. Bumble) and Katelynn McCarthy (Widow Corney) for giving me stitches from laughing; Nikki Kuehnel (Nancy) and Bryce Johnson (Bill Sikes) for pulling off a genuinely upsetting murder scene; Cameron Secord (The Artful Dodger) for being wonderfully animated and for making me laugh hard; Jon Taylor (Fagin) for making me want to lead a life of crime and singing (together, of course); and Jon Nicolle (Mr. Brownlow) for staying calm upon seeing Nancy's dead body.

Finally, the chorus must be recognized for their wicked dancing, singing, and their ability to look like starving work-house orphans at a moment's notice.

Oliver was full of tiny and whimsical details, from the very authentic accents, to the costumes, and the lighting. Every emotion felt real; every note in the music was needed. It was by no means stripped down; in fact it was quite showy, but the true talent never got lost among the smoke and mirrors, making it a very beautiful journey.
