



One event ups the ante: Harbour View's musical. This year's musical is *Anything Goes*, a production made even more special because it's the tenth anniversary of the

first time the show was produced on our stage.

"We had all the right people to play the parts," explained Ms. Bosse. "And Cole Porter is hilarious."

Our musical program has lost many talented individuals from last year. In fact, every performer who had a lead role in last year's production of *Guys & Dolls* has graduated, not to mention students with supporting roles, chorus members and technicians. From the outside, it looked as if the theatre program would struggle; we certainly had very large shoes to fill. In fact, only one young actor with experience as a lead remains at the school. This meant that it was time for the rest of the performers to step up their game and meet the high standards set by previous casts.

No problem. Under the outstanding direction of Ms. Bosse, and the musical leadership of Ms. Sanderson, with help from choir director Chris Lane, *Anything Goes* looks to be yet another hit for Harbour View High. Taylor Breneol (Reno Sweeney), Caleb Hunter (Billy Crocker), Emily Alston (Hope Harcourt) and Alex Taylor (Lord Evelyn Oakleigh) will be sailing the high seas in Cole Porter's Tony Award winning musical. The story takes place on an ocean liner bound from New York City to London and is filled with recognizable tunes like "You're the Top" and "I Get a Kick Out of You."

"I felt fear and excitement," said Taylor Breneol when asked how she felt about her first lead role.

"*Anything Goes* is only my second year in musical and in the beginning I felt ill-equipped for having a lead role. I was told by the directors that they wouldn't have picked me if they didn't believe in me, and that pushed me to want to overcome that fear and become Reno Sweeney, the queen of sass."

Emily Alston also had misgivings about her part. "I grew up watching Harbour View musicals," she said, "so some of the previous leading females kindled my love for acting. I wanted to be just like them someday. So it's a very strange and amazing feeling to have the torch passed on to me and the other leads, and to be considered one of the big kids."

*Anything Goes* will be performed in the Fletcher Peacock Auditorium October 8-10 at 7:30. Tickets are on sale now at the Harbour View High office. Adults are \$15 and Students and Seniors are \$12. For more information call 658-5359.

Tori George is the woman behind all of the beautiful dance numbers people have enjoyed over the last two years of musicals at Harbour View. Without her dedication and talent, we wouldn't have had show-stopping numbers like "Consider Yourself" from *Oliver!* and "Luck be a Lady" from last year's production of *Guys & Dolls*. She's been hard at work with the cast of *Anything Goes* since late August.

Tori's love of dancing started when she was only four years old and her parents decided to enroll her in dance lessons as something fun for her to do. When Tori isn't at the school helping with musical, she's teaching five other dance classes with students ranging from ages three to seventeen at Dance Encore.

"I love absolutely everything about it here at HVHS. The students are amazing to work with and all the staff that I've met are all really nice," said Tori.

Although hard-pressed to choose just one dance she enjoyed choreographing, Tori said: "Working on one dance from this show has been a great experience because the two students that star in it, Taylor Breneol and Caleb Hunter, are fantastic people to work with due to their energy level and concentration every time they get on stage for rehearsals."

Working with just one or two dancers is one thing, working with a larger group is another. "There's no specific dance that was overly difficult, but some dances definitely take longer to choreograph, especially if it's a bigger dance number with a larger group of people. Usually I can listen to the song a few times and envision the dance in my head. Once in a while it turns out that as amazing as something might look in my head, it turns out that when I'm watching it live I can see that it doesn't actually work, so I have to change things from time to time."

## Sound Engineer Malcolm Boyce

Malcolm Boyce has been well-known to Harbour View's theatre department, ever since he began working as the head of sound for HVHS's productions in 2005. He takes care of all the equipment and sound for the yearly musical, looking after everything from the actors onstage to any sound effects needed.

Boyce began in the sound industry when he graduated from high school 25 years ago. He had hoped to do more recording jobs, but it was easier for him to make an income doing live performances.

One aspect of Boyce's job includes creating sounds to add to a show, including the dripping sounds and the slight echo added to the voices during the sewer scene in last year's production of *Guys & Dolls*, one of his favourite shows because of all the sound effects. Ironically, Boyce is happy when audience members don't actually notice the extra sounds effects, since he hopes to immerse the crowd even further into the show.

"Most of the work I do is during the week," Boyce said, "as opposed to Tori [George] who works most days."

Boyce is no stranger to *Anything Goes*.

"I did the show ten years ago with these guys," he recalled. "It was the first musical I did on the Harbour View stage. I remember that there were cast members for whom this was their first show and they were shocked at first at the audience's response when they could hear them. The audience was laughing at the jokes, and it's not that the jokes were funnier, it's that they could actually hear the words."

Although some people might believe bringing in professionals to do sound takes away from it being a school production, Boyce disagrees.

"The kids get a better experience with professional sound, the same way kids don't make the costumes, or conduct the orchestra." He hopes that since Harbour View's musicals are now in the fall that he'll have the opportunity to participate in more high school productions.

Still, Boyce has high praise for what happens on the HVHS stage. "There's a really positive attitude at this school whenever I come over to do these shows. Everything about what happens here I really enjoy. I've done lots of productions at this level, and this program has grown so much; it's setting the standard around here."





# Vikings from around the world



## Ever wonder what it's like to go to school in Germany?

I have been an exchange student at HVHS for just a few weeks now and I think some students and teachers might be interested to learn the differences between German schools and Harbour View High school. I would like to inform you about my school and the German school system, as well as some differences between the German schools and Canadian Schools.

In Germany everybody has to go to school once they turn six years old and has to stay in school for a minimum of 12 years. First you must go for four years to the primary school where you learn reading, writing, and basic techniques of mathematics. In Germany we do not have Middle school. We go directly to high school. High school has students from fifth grade to twelfth grade. Students are as young as nine or ten when they start.

Depending on how well you did in primary school went, you can choose from different types of schools including:

1. The *Gymnasium* which provides the highest level of education and where you also can take classes at A-Levels. This is like the British system. A-levels allow you to go to university if you do well on the final exam in grade 12 called Abitur.
2. The *Realschule* and the *Mittelschule* are two other types of high schools which have lower levels of education and are attended by students who do not want to study at a university.

At the school I attended, you have to stay for eight years to graduate. School always begins for all grade levels on the same day at 7:55 a.m. This is after six weeks of summer holidays. Usually the day ends for younger students at 12:55 p.m., unless you have to go to detention on Friday afternoon. Afternoon classes start when you are in Grade Six.

At my school, we start English as a second language in Grade 5. After fifth grade we have to decide what our second non-mother language will be. We chose between Latin and French. After seventh grade we have to make more decisions. We can take Spanish as a third language, or start chemistry and computer classes one year early, or take business and economics. After 9th grade you can replace the second foreign language (French or Latin) with Spanish or Italian. If you decide not to change your second foreign language, you have to remove one science class from your timetable.

In my school, the teachers come to the students; we stay in the same room and we only change the room if we are using the computers labs or have a science lab or are going to gym class. This means that you will have the same classmates for a lot of the day. We have religion classes. If a student is atheist or belongs to a non-Christian religion, they would go to an Ethics class.

In Germany, the year is not divided into semesters. Our subjects go all year. Our timetable is different. We do not have the same classes every day. In Grade 10 we take English, Math, Spanish, Economics, German, Physics, and Chemistry. These classes are the only courses that have big exams. Our other subjects are History, Geography, Music, Art, Biology, Religion, Computer, Gym and Economics. These subjects do not have big exams. We have surprise tests, or the teacher might ask us to summarize our lessons out loud. Our participation is also marked. Each period is only 45 minutes long; the Physical Education class takes twice as long, but is only once per week.

The Green Party is not as popular as the three bigger parties but their promises are much different from those of the Liberals and Conservatives. Elizabeth May wants to get rid of university tuition and ban unpaid internships. This party wants to reduce federal taxes for small businesses and raise the taxes on corporate companies as well as raise the taxes on tobacco and alcohol.
