

Doin' it for a doll: HVHS brings Guys and Dolls to stage

Guys and Dolls is a Broadway musical based on "The Idyll of Miss Sarah Brown" and "Blood Pressure" – two short stories by Damon Runyon. It was first performed on Broadway in 1950, but this year it's coming to the Harbour View stage.

The show is "a charming 1940's story about gamblers and complicated love. It involves a whole lot of ridiculous singing and fun times," says Tom Spencer who plays the part of Nicely-Nicely Johnson.

The show follows the lives of Sarah Brown (Leah Robichaud), Sky Masterson (Jon Taylor), Nathan Detroit (Ethan Gaunce) and Miss Adelaide (Mallory McDonald). Nathan Detroit runs an illegal "crap game" but due to the high police activity in the area, they have only one spot to hold the game: the Biltmore garage. The owner of the garage, however, requires a \$1,000 security deposit – which is money that Nathan doesn't have. He hopes to get the money by winning a bet against Sky Masterson, a notorious gambler. Nathan believes this bet is one he can't lose: Sky must take a "doll" of Nathan's choice to Havana, Cuba. He ends up choosing Sergeant Sarah Brown, the local mission president. Will Nathan get the money to host his game, or will Sky be able to convince Sarah to be his date? Throughout the show, you learn that saints and sinners aren't all that different.

If you weren't already aware, this year's musical schedule has dramatically changed since last year. If you're wondering where all your friends who are part of the cast have been for the past few weeks after school, they've been at rehearsals almost every day over the course of six weeks.

"It was more intense, but it forced me to stay focused." Mallory McDonald said.



"Everyone should come see the show," Tom Spencer said, "It's hundreds of hours of work put into by countless talented people. It should be an astounding spectacle."

Although the cast aren't on Broadway (yet), they have all put in enough work to wow everyone in the audience. "I told our choreographer, Tori George, that I wanted dancing in every scene to keep the high energy throughout," Ms. Bossé told me. This is definitely a classic, fun production you won't want to miss out on. Tickets are \$12 for students and seniors, and \$15 for adults. Hope to see you there!



DOLL SAYS: MALLORY MCDONALD






Meet your new grade nine rep: Alexandre Banks

Meet Christopher Lane - Harbour View's new Choral Ensemble director

The Harbour View Choral Ensemble is one of our school's most notable organizations. The choir is respected, both at home and around the world. Since 2003, the choir has travelled to many places including Germany, Austria, France, Italy, the Czech Republic, and Holland.

For many years the choir was directed by Michael Molloy, who retired in 2013. His unique approach to teaching made him a well-respected instructor which, in turn, allowed the students to perform difficult material. Filling his enormous shoes was Mrs. Morgan-Ahearn's job for the 2013-2014 academic year.

The Harbour View Choral Ensemble is ready to continue with a new director, Christopher Lane. Mr. Lane is the Director of Music at St. David's Church in Rothesay, and a private voice instructor. He recently participated in a choral workshop at the school with the Canadian Chamber Choir, of which he is a member. Mr. Lane has helped many students at Harbour View prepare for roles in musical and solo performances. We'd like to welcome Mr. Lane to the Harbour View family by asking him a few questions.

Q: How do you feel picking up the Harbour View Choir torch?

A: I'm honoured and humbled to be asked to take on this wonderful program. I'm thrilled to be able to carry on the great tradition of choral music that was established at HVHS by Mr. Molloy. I've been very fortunate to work with the students of Harbour View on the musicals for the past five years and while not a member of the staff, I do feel very much a part of the Viking team. (Don't tell my fellow Greyhound alumni!) I'm also very grateful to Ms. Power, Mrs. Pitman and Mme. Ahearn who will be assisting with the choir in various capacities throughout the year.

Q: What are your plans for the choir?

A: I feel I can bring a different style of vocal training to the group from my years of experience singing and conducting choirs of all ages and stages. Ms. Sanderson and I have talked about ways that we can incorporate members of the Senior Band program into a few of the choral selections with solos and accompaniment. I'm also looking at bringing some of the hottest choral composers' music into the library (check out Eric Whitacre and the Virtual Choir on YouTube) and expanding the musical focus of the HV Jazz Choir to include some more challenging work for chamber choir.

Q: Where do you see yourself five years from now?

A: I hope in five years to be still working with the students of Harbour View, and especially the choral program. Any time change happens, it takes at least two to three years to develop the program to the place where one hopes it can be. I would like to see HVCE return to national and international travel and share the talents of the HVCE with other schools and choirs. While preparing for touring takes a lot of hard work and preparation, not to mention excessive fundraising. These are the experiences that make choir even more fun and appealing.

Q: Do you have any personal insight to those who wish to join the choir?

A: Choir is about more than just singing. It's about building a community of people who enjoy making music and spending time together. For some, it will have been a few years since they last sang in a school choir and the perception as we get to high school can become that choir is 'not cool.' Harbour View has built a choral program over the last decade and a half that disproves this notion. I'd encourage anyone who has thought about singing to come out and join us on Tuesdays after school from 3:30-5 starting October 14.

During the summer there are three qualifiers and you need at least two qualifying scores to make it to regionals. At regionals, whoever wins overall gets to go to nationals! They judge you on turn out, a written test and two ridden tests.

The escalating crisis in the Ukraine: The new cold war

What you need to know:

- Peaceful protests in the Ukraine started in November of 2013 after Ukrainian President Viktor Yanukovych chose to sign a free trade agreement with Russia.
- On 18 February 2014, the protests turned violent and left 82 people dead and more than 1,100 people injured.
- On 22 February, the protesters ran the President out of Kiev and he fled for eastern Ukraine.
- On 1 March 2014, Russia's parliament approved a request from President Vladimir Putin to send Russian troops into the Ukraine.
- By 2 March, Russian troops had complete control over Crimea.
- Crimea is now considered to be a part of Russia by Russian officials; however the EU and the US disagree
- Russia's troops have remained in the Ukraine ever since that day in March.

What an expert says:

With NATO closing in on President Vladimir Putin, the Russians are starting to get defensive. Although the combined force of NATO is numerically superior to that of Russia's a war is in no one's best interest.

One NATO specialist, Ian Davis, agrees. "Driving Russia into a corner plays into the arguments of those most hostile to forging a productive relationship with the US and its allies. It is not a sound basis for future stability in Europe, particularly when no current or projected threats warrant extending that alliance.

While expansion doesn't justify the Russian reaction, it does help explain it. I think it is important to see the issue from a Russian perspective. Of course, it is far-fetched to think that NATO expansion into Ukraine would threaten Russian national security, but the crisis reveals the complete failure of NATO, the EU and Russia to find a path toward defence and security cooperation in the post-Cold War era. The support for the "open enlargement" of NATO has continued to send the wrong signals to both Kiev and Moscow. And the current reaction within NATO raises the prospects of continual, if not escalating, NATO-European-Russian tensions."

The key challenge now is to find ways for the US, EU, Ukraine and Russia to cooperate in a Contact Group, while working with the NATO-Russia Council and NATO-Ukrainian Commission. This, however, will require truly engaged diplomacy."

Why you should care:

Though the majority of you reading this may not be old enough to remember the Cold War, and admittedly neither am I, it is safe to say that it was not a good time in our history. The Cold War was a period of time when the world was being more reactive than proactive in solving their differences. Already the current situation in the Ukraine is causing tension quite similar to that of the Cold War era, and if not dealt with properly it could ultimately end in all out war.

With all of the issues we face as the human race, this petty grab for a more Soviet like border is highly unnecessary. There are far more important things that we should be dealing with in order to strive for a better, more prosperous world.

Pumpkin Pie Spice Snickerdoodles

Ingredients~

- 1 cup of butter at room temperature
- 1 cup of light brown sugar
- ½ cup of granulated sugar
- 2 eggs plus 1 extra yolk
- 2 tsp of vanilla
- 3 tsp of pumpkin pie spice
- 1 tsp of baking powder
- 3/4 tsp of salt
- 3 cups of flour

Coating~

1/4 cup of light brown sugar1/2 tsp of pumpkin pie spice

Instructions~

Mix the butter and both sugars together in the bowl of a stand mixer until light and fluffy.

Add in both eggs and additional yolk into mixture along with vanilla and beat until smooth, scraping the sides as necessary.

Mix in pumpkin spice, baking powder and salt until combined.

Reduce sped of mixer to low and mix in flour until dough comes together.

Chill dough for at least an hour. When the dough is ready to bake, line a baking sheet with parchment paper and preheat your oven to 375°.

Mix coating ingredients (1/4 cup of light brown sugar and 11/2 tsp of pumpkin pie spice) together in a bowl and set it aside.



Roll dough into large balls, about 1½ inches in diameter, and then roll into the coating (light brown sugar and pumpkin pie spice mixture) until each one is coated completely.

Bake for 7-8 minutes until cookies are lightly browned on the bottom. Remove from oven and transfer onto a wire rack to cool down.

My Everything - Ariana Grande

The rise of Ariana Grande, from Nickelodeon television network mainstay to pop superstar in less than a two year period is astounding to say the least. Ari broke out musically in spring 2013, when her first major-label release, the Mac Miller assisted "The Way" reached the top 10 of the Billboard Hot 100. Her debut album, entitled *Yours Truly* would be released that summer and would reach the top of the Billboard Albums chart. The key difference between this and other pop efforts is Ariana's vocal capabilities. When Miss Grande opens her mouth, she really excels. The raw talent, reminiscent of a young Mariah Carey, is something to behold. Don't get me wrong though, this album is by no means revolutionary nor will it receive any awards for originality, but by looking at it as what it is, a modern-day pop album, it exceeds what we've come to expect from today's pop landscape. Songs of Innocence - U2


