

Alumni return to HVHS stage for Legally Blonde

Very rarely does somebody's career choices bring them full circle, allowing them to return to the place where it all started. Luckily, this is the case for Kory Fulton (2009) and Cameron Secord (2014). These two former Harbour View students made the choice to pursue performing after graduation and have come back to the school for this year's production of *Legally Blonde*. Fulton will be playing a character named Carlos with Secord portraying his Latin lover, Nikos.

"I knew by grade 12 that performing was going to become my passion," said Secord. "Mom's side of the family is very artsy, so Mom taught me to play guitar and what I needed to know about singing."

Both Kory and Cameron have had extensive theatrical careers. Kory participated in singing competitions from the time he was twelve years old and was a long-time member of KidSing Performance School.

"It was always my goal to work in the entertainment industry on the performance side. Being in the musicals as well as KidSing gave me the extra confidence to push me into pursuing it."

One of the highlights of Fulton's career was getting the opportunity to play Danny Zuko in *Grease* for Broadway At Sea on the "Harmony of the Seas," cruise ship. He also had the chance to perform with Olivia Newton-John, a songstress who achieved success on the music charts during the 1970s and is best known for her role as Sandy in the 1978 film adaptation of the musical.

Cameron, on the other hand, has appeared in productions across Atlantic Canada, and he debuted an original play, *The Disappearance of Scarlett Sky* at the Fundy Fringe Festival in August 2018, which he called the highlight of his career. The murder mystery won Performer's Pick, Fan Pick, and Best Show.

While in school, the pair were actively involved in the musicals and choral ensemble. Fulton's last show with Harbour View was *Honk* in the spring of 2009, a show which he also choreographed. Secord's last student performance was as The Artful Dodger in *Oliver* five years later.

After years of being away, both Fulton and Secord are back and are so proud of what they get to witness,

"It's heartwarming to see how passionate everybody is about performing and how close a family the cast has become. It's amazing that much of the ensemble will pursue entertainment after high school," said Secord.

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



"I don't think it's going to go as well (as before) but with hard working students and committed family volunteers, the job will definitely get done," said Dixon.

According to Dixon, this year's garden is growing onions, carrots, beets, kale, lettuce, watermelon, blueberries, raspberries, strawberries, tomatoes, green peppers and a variety of herbs. The amazing variety of vegetables does not go to waste. The vegetables harvested from the garden are given back to students in the form of free healthy lunches prepared by Mrs. Gallagher and the HVHS culinary tech classes. From school garden to cafeteria tables, the produce is of the highest quality.

New nutrition policy leaves a bitter taste for some

Despite the province's efforts, New Brunswick's recently modified nutrition policy is facing a great deal of criticism. Concerned parents, school faculty, and students are attributing this to unnecessarily strict rules, and a lack of communication.

Michael Butler, principal of HVHS, explained that the unmodified policy had loopholes. Schools were provided with a list of foods that were permitted (salads, fruits, smoothies) and foods that were not (cakes, processed sweets, dark pops) but there was a confusing gray area where the restrictions became unclear. The new policy removes that by reducing the list of permissible items. Halloween candies, birthday cakes, and other treats are no longer acceptable. The juices and chocolate milk that could previously be purchased from both the cafeteria and vending machines, have been replaced with water, white milk, and flavoured waters.

Staff, parents, and volunteers are worried about how this policy will affect fundraising. The organizers of the annual fall musical's canteen are already struggling to accomplish what would usually be a simple bake sale. The new limitations make it difficult to vend inexpensive products which is likely to affect sales.

"The policy teaches elimination rather than moderation," said Emily Mifflin, grade twelve student.

Emily and other students are worried that the revised policy could be misinforming the youth of the province by encouraging unhealthy dieting habits.

"The policy is restrictive," said Mr. Butler, "but it does address a legitimate concern." He explains that while some people perceive certain aspects of the policy as "extreme," a significant amount of the criticism would be alleviated if the regulations were better communicated. "If the policy can open students' eyes to healthier alternatives and the importance of a healthy lifestyle, I consider that effective."





Grade 8 student Danny Cunningham takes part in a fingerprinting lab, one of the enrichment activities organized by teachers and students at HVHS.


