If I were a rich man: Students start rehearsals for this year's musical *Fiddler on the Roof*

Musical is back at Harbour View! If you missed out on last year's performance of *Phantom of The Opera*, don't feel bad; there is another amazing production coming your way!

HVHS is presenting *Fiddler on The Roof* as their 2013 production. This musical follows the life of father of five, Tevye and the struggles he and his family must face in the socially shifting climate of their village, Anatevka in Russia. Set in the early 1900's, the musical is full of amazing songs and funny and emotionally moving moments.

"We are performing this 'timeless classic' (fraught with political and historical intrigue) this year because we have all of the right people to fit all of these challenging roles," says Ms. Bossé. "Another perfect cast!"

Sarah Alston plays Tevye's oldest daughter, Tzeitel. "I'm really excited to quick start my life," says Sarah. "I get married and get pregnant all within two hours." Other cast members include Jacob Dempster (playing Tevye), and Kylie Fox (as Tevye's wife, Golde).

Along with these familiar faces are some senior students who have never participated in musical before.

"It just seemed as though after SCENES the interest in being up on the stage exploded," explains Ms. Sanderson, who is in charge of student care among many other things.

"I really had a lot of fun in SCENES," says David Copp, a grade 12 student who



has never been in musical before. "It made me sad to think that I would never been on stage again, so I tried out. I didn't really care what part I got, so long as I had a few lines."

The musical is very lucky to have their incredible team of teachers leading them through the production process again this year. Ms. Bossé, Ms. Sanderson, and Mr. Molloy are all vital in making a show work, along with many other teacher and parent volunteers.

"Last year our volunteers raised a Phantom and this year we're raising a fiddler," says Ms. Sanderson. "We really couldn't do it without the parent volunteers, who build and paint the sets, sew the costumes and feed us during the rehearsal process."







Grad class promotes tan free prom

This year the Grad Class Executive is working with the Canadian Cancer Society to promote a Tan Free Prom. We are asking all grads to pledge to not tan intentionally before our prom in June. This may seem like a lot to ask; however, it simply involves slathering on some sun block and avoiding tanning beds!

Tan Free Prom is a new initiative from the Canadian Cancer Society to promote skin cancer awareness. Skin cancer is the most preventable type of cancer, so we are trying to change the attitude towards tanning. Any sign of skin discoloration, like a tan or a burn, is a sign of skin damage! Any person puts themselves at risk by exposing their unprotected skin to ultraviolet radiation, which can come from the sun or tanning beds.

Many people think tanning beds are a healthy way of getting a natural glow before prom; however, there is nothing healthy or natural about them. Some tanning beds emit five times as much ultraviolet radiation as the sun does! Youth who use tanning beds put themselves at risk for Melanoma, which is the deadliest form of cancer. An adolescent who uses a tanning bed has 87% more chance of developing Melanoma as opposed to someone who does not. Melanoma is the most common form of cancer in people aged 15 to 29 and also kills the most.

The Grad Class Executive is asking all the seniors to think

twice before lying in a tanning bed or skipping the sun

block. Health is much more important than the “beauty” associated with tanning. Besides, many people think natural skin is more attractive than an obvious tan.



Canadian Cancer Society Reveals the Truth Behind Tanning Bed Myths:

- Myth:** “I’m getting a base tan.”
- The Truth:** A tan does not actually provide good protection from the sun; it actually will harm more than it will help! Sun block is a more effective way to have protection from painful burns.
- Myth:** “A tan makes me healthier!”
- The Truth:** It may appear to be healthier, but the damage is done. Too much tanning can lead to premature aging, which means getting wrinkles.
- Myth:** “I’m getting vitamin D from the tanning bed.”
- The Truth:** Just a few minutes of unprotected exposure to the sun can be enough for someone to obtain their daily dose of vitamin D. There are safer alternatives to get vitamin D without using a harmful tanning bed.



